Re: Memorializing County Executive Adam J. Bello, Sheriff Todd Baxter and Mayor Malik Evans to Oppose the Decision of the United States Supreme Court in *Grants Pass v Johnson* and Resist Punishing Unhoused Individuals

Honorable Legislators:

The recent ruling by the United States Supreme Court in *Grants Pass v. Johnson* has raised serious concerns about the treatment of unhoused individuals across the country. The court found that the arrest and fining of people sleeping outdoors—regardless of the lack of available shelter— does not violate the Eighth Amendment's prohibition of "cruel and unusual punishment."

This ruling opens the door to harsher punitive measures against those experiencing homelessness. However, we strongly urge you to resist taking steps that further criminalize homelessness and poverty in our community.

In our own county, we have witnessed troubling practices such as the "sweeps" of homeless encampments, where people are forcibly removed and their personal belongings confiscated, often without a judicial warrant or probable cause. These actions are ineffective and harmful, especially when the resources offered do not align with the unique needs of individuals in these situations. Many are under "sanction," preventing them from accessing shelters or benefits due to previous rule violations, while others face serious mental health challenges for which there are few available treatments.

Critically, not a single person displaced from a homeless encampment has been offered immediate access to permanent housing. Rather than punitive measures, we should prioritize providing stable housing for every member of our community.

Until we achieve that goal, we respectfully request that our community refrains from arrests, forced removals, and the seizure of personal belongings from those sleeping outdoors. These actions do not address the root causes of homelessness and only serve to exacerbate an already dire situation.

Subject: Memorializing the New York State Legislature to Pass and Governor Kathy Hochul to Sign Bill A10661/S9908, "Increases the Designation of Certain Offenses Relating to Unlawfully Fleeing a Police Officer and Makes Such Offenses Eligible for Bail"

Honorable Legislators:

On August 22, 2024, a senseless tragedy occurred when a stolen car driven by a 17-year-old repeat offender took the life of an innocent citizen. This heartbreaking incident is not an isolated event but part of a larger, dangerous trend in Monroe County, where car thefts, especially those carried out by the so-called "Kia Boyz," have reached crisis levels. Thanks to New York's ill-conceived Raise the Age and Bail Reform laws, career criminals, many of them juveniles, are treated with kid gloves, receiving nothing more than appearance tickets and being quickly released back onto our streets to commit more crimes. The current law fails to adequately address the severity of unlawful fleeing from police officers, with only misdemeanor or low-level felony charges applied. Bill A10661/S9908 would fix this by increasing the penalties to more appropriate felony levels and making these offenses bail-eligible, allowing judges to keep dangerous offenders behind bars.

New York must at-least restore a shred of sanity to its criminal justice system by passing A10661/S9908. The bill rightly increases the classification of offenses for unlawfully fleeing a police officer in a motor vehicle, ensuring that criminals who recklessly endanger the lives of police and innocent bystanders are not treated with leniency. Making these offenses bail-eligible is a necessary step to protect our communities. Judges must have the discretion to detain those who pose an immediate threat to public safety, rather than being forced to release them under misguided reforms that have proven time and again to fail.

This legislation addresses an urgent public safety issue. Reckless drivers who flee from police create a domino effect of danger, often leading to high-speed chases that endanger law enforcement and innocent citizens alike. Strengthening the penalties for fleeing from police and making these offenses bail-eligible will not only serve as a deterrent but will also empower law

enforcement to do their jobs without the fear of seeing dangerous criminals back on the streets just hours after their arrest.

Additionally, this bill stands for fairness and justice. It restores accountability to our legal system by ensuring that those who put lives at risk are met with serious consequences. New Yorkers deserve to live in communities where the rule of law is respected, where law enforcement is supported, and where the rights of law-abiding citizens are prioritized. This bill sends a clear message: in New York State, we will no longer tolerate lawlessness, especially from repeat offenders who show blatant disregard for the safety of others.

Passing A10661/S9908 is a necessary course correction to counter the disastrous effects of recent criminal justice reforms. By increasing penalties and making fleeing offenses bail-eligible, we will begin to restore law and order in our streets, protect our communities, and empower law enforcement to do their jobs effectively. Therefore, we urge you to join us in calling upon the New York State Legislature to pass, and Governor Kathy Hochul to sign, A10661/S9908, because the safety and security of New Yorkers must come first.

Memorializing New York State Legislature to Pass and Governor Kathy Subject: Hochul to Sign Bills S.4583-A/A.5942-A Amending the County Law, in **Relation to the Next Generation 911 System**

Honorable Legislators:

Next Generation 911 (NG911) represents a critical step forward in modernizing our emergency response infrastructure. This digital, internet protocol (IP)-based system will replace the outdated analog 911 framework that has been in place for decades, bringing with it advanced capabilities that are essential for ensuring public safety in today's world. With the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) expected to soon mandate that 911 Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) support NG911, we must prepare for the transition. The latest 911 technology, such as pinpointing the exact location of mobile callers, translating text messages at 911 PSAPs, and ensuring robust backup resources between counties, will be vital to safeguarding our communities.

The move to NG911 requires much more than just technological upgrades—it involves a fundamental overhaul of the system's infrastructure, including the establishment of an Emergency Services IP Network (ESInet). However, the transition comes at a significant cost. The federal government estimated in 2018 that deploying NG911 across the nation would require between \$9.5 billion and \$12.7 billion, with the total 10-year lifecycle costs reaching \$13.5 billion to \$16.1 billion. Here in New York State, it is projected that the NG911 overhaul will cost over \$2 billion over the next decade. Local county 911 departments lack the financial resources to independently build their own ESInets, and without adequate state funding, we risk creating a patchwork system that fails to meet the crucial standards of NG911 or provide the necessary safety upgrades.

Monroe County's centralized PSAP, which handles over 1 million emergency dispatches annually, is among the largest in the country. The financial burden of modernizing such a complex system should not fall solely on county governments and their taxpayers. 

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Democratic Commissioner Jackie Ortiz and Republican Commissioner Lisa P. Nicolay of the Board of Elections.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body enact a Local Law entitled "Authorizing a Lease by Negotiation with Smith Street Partners LLC for Office Space at 435 Smith Street, Rochester, New York" for a total term of twenty (20) years for office and warehouse space by the County of Monroe, commencing on August 1, 2025.

The space will consist of approximately 57,785 square feet located on a 4.17 acre parcel at a cost of \$11.25 per square foot for the first year and escalating at a rate of 2.7% for each year of the term, on a modified gross basis. The lease may be renewed for one (1) additional five (5) year term upon mutual consent of the parties, at a continued escalation of rent at 2.7% each year.

A lease of space at 435 Smith Street would enable the County to consolidate the Board of Elections four (4) locations into one (1) centrally located space. The space at 435 Smith Street would accommodate 1,000 new voting machines while acting as an all in one facility for the Board of Elections. Staying in the four (4) current locations would require extensive buildouts, would not provide the opportunity for future expansion, and would require additional space for storage.





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

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with CHA Consulting, Inc. in the amount of \$318,300 for design services for the Airport Pavement Management Study Project.

A pavement management study provides a consistent, objective, and systematic procedure for establishing facility policies, setting priorities and schedules, allocating resources, and budgeting for pavement maintenance and rehabilitation. A pavement management study not only evaluates the present condition of a pavement, but also predicts its future conditions through the use of pavement condition indicators. The project includes updates to the pavement network definition, updates to the associated mapping and pavement management database, and a visual evaluation of the pavement condition. In addition, the Engineered Materials Arresting Systems ("EMAS") will be evaluated and a maintenance recommendation for the Runway 10-28 EMAS bed will be provided.





Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 280 of 2023 to increase the grant award from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation ("NYSDEC") for Climate Smart Communities for the Climate Vulnerability Assessment from the amount of \$75,000 to the amount of \$150,000 and for the Climate Adaptation Plan from the amount of \$100,000 to the amount of \$200,000, and authorize a contract with T.Y. Lin International Engineering & Architecture, P.C. ("TYLin"), in the amount of \$370,000, for professional design services for the Monroe County Climate Adaptation and Resiliency Plan ("CARP").

Monroe County has long been a leader in innovative sustainability policy that has been both environmentally friendly and cost effective. On September 13, 2022, Your Honorable Body adopted the Climate Action Plan Phase I (Resolution No. 276 of 2022), which focused on reducing greenhouse gas emissions from internal Monroe County government operations, and on August 13, 2024 adopted the Climate Action Plan Phase II (Resolution No. 231 of 2024), which was directed towards supporting the local community in their climate mitigation efforts. By Resolution 280 of 2023, Your Honorable Body solidified the County's commitment to climate initiatives by accepting grants from NYSDEC for Climate Smart Communities for Climate Vulnerability Assessment and Climate Adaptation Plan.

While the intention of the Climate Action Plan is to limit the conditions for future climate change, the next step is to address the impacts to our community. The CARP will identify, analyze, and prioritize the effects of climate hazards and risks (such as flooding, power outages, heat stress and drought), on critical infrastructure, specific population segments, geographic areas, and assets.

In order to retain a consultant to undertake the CARP, this action will increase the Climate Smart Communities grant awards from the NYSDEC to an amount of \$150,000 (previously \$75,000) for the Climate Vulnerability Assessment grant and \$200,000 (previously \$100,000) for the Climate Adaptation Plan grant. The additional grant funds will be used to expand public participation and further develop the resilience planning for both physical and socioeconomic infrastructure with consideration of several climate scenarios with more nuance and specificity. The total project authorization will be \$700,000, with a grant amount of \$350,000 and a matching fund amount of \$350,000 under the County's Climate Initiatives.

The Monroe County Department of Environmental Services will lead the project funded by this grant and administer the grant requirements.

Several consultants were considered to provide professional design services for the CARP, with T.Y. Lin International Engineering & Architecture, P.C rated as the most qualified to provide these services.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend Resolution 280 of 2023 to increase the grant award from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation for Climate Smart Communities to the amount of \$150,000 for the Climate Vulnerability Assessment.
- 2. Amend Resolution 280 of 2023 to increase the grant award from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation for Climate Smart Communities to the amount of \$200,000 for the Climate Adaptation Plan.
- 3. Amend the 2024 operating budget of the Department of Environmental Services by appropriating the sum of \$350,000 into general fund 9300, funds center 8301020000 Climate Initiatives.
- 4. Amend the 2024 operating budget of the Department of Environmental Services by appropriating the sum of \$350,000 of general fund committed fund balance into general fund 9001, funds center 8301020000 Climate Initiatives.

Lin International Engineering & Architecture, P.C., 255 East Avenue, Rochester, New York 14604, in the amount of \$370,000 for professional design services for the Monroe County Climate Adaptation and Resilience Plan.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(27) ("conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this contract, consistent with authorized uses, is included in the 2024 operating budget of the Department of Environmental Services, general fund 9001, funds center 8301020000, Climate Initiatives. No additional net County support is required in the Monroe County budget.

The Climate Smart Communities grants require equal local funding matches in the amounts of \$150,000 for the Climate Vulnerability Assessment and \$200,000 for the Climate Adaptation Plan. The local matches will require additional net County support, for which the appropriation of general fund committed fund balance is requested.



Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a lease agreement with the Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District ("MCSWCD") to continue to lease office space located at the Monroe County Fleet Center, Building 5, 145 Paul Road for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025, with the option to renew for four (4) additional one-year terms; and authorize a contract with the MCSWCD, in an amount not to exceed \$65,000 for stormwater management consulting services for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025 through December 31, 2025, with the option to renew for four (4) additional one-year terms.

Per Resolutions 270 of 2012, 237 of 2014, 109 of 2015, and 153 of 2020, Your Honorable Body previously authorized a lease agreement with the MCSWCD to locate their offices at the Monroe County Fleet Center, Building 5, 145 Paul Road. Per Resolutions 97 and 98 of 2011, 109 of 2015, and 153 of 2020, Your Honorable Body previously authorized contracts with the MCSWCD to provide services related to stormwater management.

The MCSWCD will provide stormwater management consulting services for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025 for a total cost of \$65,000. The Stormwater Coalition of Monroe County will provide the funding for this contract to support stormwater mitigation activities conducted by its municipal members. The Stormwater Coalition of Monroe County established funding authorization as part of the annual budget process.

The MCSWCD will compensate the County with additional services in lieu of rent equivalent to the market-value annual rent of \$20,000. The term of the lease will be concurrent with the stormwater management consulting contract with the MCSWCD and contain a 30-day termination clause. The lease may be renewed up to four (4) additional one-year terms when a stormwater management consulting contract is executed.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a lease agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District to lease office space at the Monroe County Fleet Center, Building 5, 145 Paul Road for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025, with the option to renew for four (4) additional one-year terms.

2. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with the Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District, 145 Paul Road, Rochester, New York 14624, in an amount not to exceed \$65,000 for stormwater management consulting services for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025, with the option to renew the lease for four (4) additional one-year terms.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this contract is included in the Department of Environmental Services, fund 9626, Stormwater Coalition Trust Fund. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

The Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District is a not-for-profit agency, and the records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that it does not owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.



Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2024-2029 Capital Improvement Program and the 2024 Capital Budget to add a project entitled "MCC Downtown Campus Career Center" in the amount of \$14,500,000 and authorize financing for the project in the amount of \$14,500,000.

This project intends to leverage the strengths of the many organizations within Monroe County's workforce system, such as the NYS Department of Labor that has expressed an interest in co-locating its primary career center alongside RochesterWorks, Inc., which will lead to better outcomes for those seeking employment pathways. Monroe Community College and its partners seek to make the workforce development system more efficient and manageable for prospective workers and employers alike. By strategically co-locating not just agencies providing workforce development programming, but also those coordinating and administering supportive services, this project aims to focus and enhance the community's efforts to remove barriers to employment. Often, a working-age individual confronts multiple obstacles to employment, both those that are systemic within their community, as well as those rooted in one's personal life. By improving access and directly linking workforce development and supportive service providers, this project will enhance, for many, the ability to navigate a career pathway.

The proposed co-location at the MCC Downtown Campus would remove a logistical barrier often felt by workforce program participants who often do not see education or training programs as feasible. This location would also provide a better, more centralized pathway to the growing number of certificate programs being offered by MCC, tailored to industry need.

Funding for the project has been identified as being provided by: Congressional Appropriation Bill for \$1,600,000; Ralph C. Wilson Foundation and Konar Foundation for \$1,500,000 combined; the New York State Empire State Development's Fund for \$5,500,000; and equal match funding through the State University of New York for \$2,950,000; and Monroe County for \$2,950,000; for total project funding of \$14,500,000. This project will be considered by the Monroe County Planning Board on October 24, 2024.

- 1. Amend the 2024-2029 Capital Improvement Program to add a project entitled "MCC Downtown Campus Career Center" in the amount of \$14,500,000.

Raise the Age legislation was enacted with a number of objectives. This intermunicipal agreement with the Rochester City School District will provide an Administrative Specialist/Educational Liaison who will work on behalf of Raise the Age youth to facilitate re-entry into school or other educational programming.



Subject: Acceptance of a Grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services for the County Reentry Task Force Program and Authorize a Contract with Delphi Drug and Alcohol Council, Inc.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services in the amount of \$795,720 and authorize a contract with Delphi Drug and Alcohol Council, Inc. ("Delphi") in the amount of \$784,500 for the County Reentry Task Force Program for the period of October 1, 2024 through September 30, 2025.

The County Reentry Task Force ("Task Force"), which is co-chaired by the County's Deputy Chief Probation Officer and includes members from over 40 local law enforcement agencies and human services providers, has a goal of reducing recidivism through improved coordination among criminal justice, social services, educational, health, and mental health systems. The Task Force is addressing the following four reintegration issues of parolees: basic education, employment, sobriety support, and housing. This grant will fund a contract with Delphi for a Local Reentry Coordinator and the provision of services related to these reintegration issues. This is the nineteenth year of grant funding for this program. This year's funding is the same amount as last year.

Delphi is a community-based behavioral health agency serving the Finger Lakes community. Delphi provides a drug and alcohol outpatient program, two domestic violence programs, and case management to clients in specialized courts and Health Home initiatives. With its capacity and experience, Delphi will provide a Local Reentry Coordinator and case managers to facilitate obtaining services for approximately 418 parole re-entry participants. Delphi will also obtain temporary housing for these participants as needed.

A request for qualifications was issued, and Delphi Drug and Alcohol Council, Inc. was rated the most qualified to provide this service.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 109 of 2024 to increase the grant award from the New York State Office of Mental Health for the PFC Dwyer Veteran Peer-to-Peer Support Program from the amount of \$185,000 to the amount of \$192,400.

The purpose of this grant is to design, implement, and evaluate veteran peer-to-peer programs for veterans who are experiencing post-traumatic stress symptoms. The goal of the program is to provide outreach and education regarding available peer-to-peer counseling. It should also encourage family, friends, and community connectedness as well as provide access to suicide prevention/intervention measures. After adoption of Resolution 109 of 2024, the County was informed by the New York State Office of Mental Health of this increase to the grant award. This additional funding represents an increase of \$7,400 from the prior year.

The grant will continue to fund the Compeer of Rochester contract for peer mentoring as approved in the subject Resolution. Additionally the grant is funding a new peer mentor contract to support the veterans nature based therapy program.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend Resolution 109 of 2024 to increase the grant award from the New York State Office of Mental Health from the amount of \$185,000 to the amount of \$192,400 for the PFC Dwyer Veteran Peer-to-Peer Support Program.
- 2. Amend the 2024 operating budget of the Veterans Service Agency by appropriating the sum of \$7,400 into general fund 9001, funds center 7401020000, Dwyer Peer to Peer Support.





Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 324 of 2023 to amend a contract with the North American Family Institute ("NAFI") in an amount not to exceed \$198,000 for a youth and police engagement program for the period of January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026.

Your Honorable Body approved the Monroe County Department of Public Safety's Youth and Police Engagement Program as part of the County's American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA") funding under Resolution No. 342 of 2022. The goal of the program is to create positive change and improve the relationships between police departments, youth, and other law enforcement representatives. Ultimately, these improved relationships will increase trust between the community and law enforcement and help to mitigate a youth's involvement in the justice system. In addition, the program will develop youth leadership and advocacy skills while fostering a positive relationship between youth and the law enforcement officers that work in their communities.

Your Honorable Body further authorized the contract with NAFI pursuant to Resolution No. 324 of 2023. NAFI works with officers and teenagers from mainstream and alternative public schools, neighborhood organizations, probation departments, youth development programs, and housing developments with documented success. Its program has been implemented in many cities across the United States, including communities in downstate New York. The youth and police model offers training, train-the-trainer model services, coaching, curriculum, and materials to participating agencies.

Amending Resolution No. 324 of 2023 to authorize a three-year term of the contract, from January 1, 2024, through December 31, 2026, is necessary to meet ARPA requirements that all ARPA funding be obligated by December 31, 2024. Resolution No. 324 of 2023 originally authorized a one-year term in the amount not to exceed \$90,000, with the option of two one-year renewals in an amount not to exceed \$90,000 in the second year and \$18,000 in the third year.

The specific legislative action required is to amend Resolution 324 of 2023 to amend a contract with the North American Family Institute, 90 Maple Street Unit 2, Stoneham, Massachusetts 02180, for a youth and police engagement program in an amount not to exceed \$198,000 for the period of January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026.

This is a Type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act. The County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to execute a contract with Concord Electric Corporation in the amount of \$2,530,000 for electrical construction services for the "County Office Building Reconstruction" project, and any amendments necessary to complete the project within the total capital fund(s) appropriation.

Section 5. Funding for this project, consistent with authorized uses, will be available in capital fund 1850 once the additional financing authorization requested is approved, and in any capital fund(s) created for the same intended purpose.

SUPERSEDING BOND RESOLUTION DATED OCTOBER 8, 2024

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$19,900,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE COUNTY OFFICE BUILDING RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT, IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$19,900,000 AND SUPERSEDING THE BOND RESOLUTION ADOPTED ON DECEMBER 14, 2021 (RESOLUTION NO. 488 OF 2021).

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the County Office Building Reconstruction Project, in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$19,900,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$9,900,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose (\$10,000,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is twenty-five (25) years, pursuant to subdivision 12(a)(1) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law, computed from June 30, 2021, the date of the first obligations issued therefor.

<u>Section 2.</u> The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$19,900,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$19,900,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

<u>Section 3.</u> The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

<u>Section 4.</u> Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local

Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- 1) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and

an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or

3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

<u>Section 7.</u> This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 488 of 2021, being a bond resolution dated December 14, 2021, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following: to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$19,900,000, and to provide \$19,900,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$9,900,000 over the \$10,000,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 488 of 2021.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

<u>Section 9.</u> This resolution shall take effect in accordance with Section C2-7 of the Monroe County Charter and the Clerk of the Legislature is hereby authorized and directed to publish this resolution or a summary hereof to be published, together with a notice attached in substantially the form and in the manner prescribed by Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Remedial actions have successfully achieved soil cleanup objectives for restricted-residential use. Residual contamination in the soil and groundwater is being managed under a Site Management Plan and Institutional controls.

The project does not impact the 100 year floodplain or any structures more than 50 years old. The project will not impact existing natural resources, historical or cultural resources and will not alter the existing community character or increase traffic. The proposed action is consistent with existing land use. Accordingly, the proposed action will have no significant effect upon the environment and is determined to be a negative determination.

The Town of Brighton 2024 Sidewalk Project involves installation of 6,300 +/- linear feet of ADA compliant, five-foot wide concrete sidewalk at four locations: 1. Elmwood Avenue (north side) between 2700 Elmwood Avenue and Highland Avenue (2,450 LF), 2. Westfall Road (north side) between Roosevelt Road and Monroe Avenue, Westfall Road (south side) between Del Rio and Edgewood Avenue (2,850 LF); 3. Edgewood Avenue (west side) between 17 Edgewood Avenue and Monroe Avenue (500 LF); 4. Allens Creek Road (north side) between Monroe Avenue and Schoolhouse Lane (800 LF).

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) EAF Mapper indicated that the sidewalk projects are near various environmental remediation sites. The Town and Country Dry Cleaners site is listed as a State Superfund Site and located approximately 750 feet northwest of the Edgewood sidewalk project, 1,350 feet north of the Westfall Road sidewalk project and 2,300 feet northwest of the Allens Creek Road sidewalk project. The remediation site will not impact these sidewalk projects as remedial actions are complete and measures are in place to control the potential for coming in contact with contamination remaining at the site. The Carriage Cleaners is a State Superfund Site and is located approximately 1,000 feet south of the Elmwood Avenue sidewalk project. This site will not impact the sidewalk project as remedial actions have successfully achieved soil cleanup objectives for commercial use. Residual contamination in the soil, groundwater, and indoor air is being managed under a Site Management Plan.

The Allens Creek Road sidewalk project is not within a floodplain. These sidewalk projects do not impact any structures more than 50 years old. The projects will not impact existing natural resources, historical or cultural resources and will not alter the existing community character or increase traffic. The proposed actions are consistent with existing land use. Accordingly, the proposed actions will have no significant effect upon the environment and is determined to be a negative determination.



Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2024-2029 Capital Improvement Program, the 2024 Capital Budget, and Bond Resolution 488 of 2021 to expand the scope and increase funding for the project entitled "County Office Building Reconstruction;" and authorize contracts with Steve General Contractor, Inc. in the amount of \$2,092,000 for general construction, Bell Mechanical Contractor, Inc. in the amount of \$6,594,400 for mechanical construction, and Concord Electric Corporation in the amount of \$2,530,000 for electrical construction for the County Office Building Reconstruction project.

The Monroe County Office Building ("COB") is a 168,000 square foot, 4-story building located at 39 West Main Street originally completed in 1896. Building systems and equipment are decades old and reaching the end of their useful service life due to age and obsolescence. Monroe County Department of Environmental Services ("DES") completed a Master Plan report in 2009 that identified deficient building infrastructure including recommendations for phased mechanical, electrical, plumbing, HVAC, envelope, energy, and code improvements to maintain the operational integrity of the building and continuity of services to users of the COB. Electrical upgrades were completed in 2012. Several bathrooms were upgraded in 2014. The exterior windows were renovated/replaced in 2021. This project will upgrade HVAC systems, enhance security infrastructure, make improvement required by the NYS Uniform Code, and improve reliability of the elevators at the COB.

Your Honorable Body, through Bond Resolution 488 of 2021, authorized financing for improvements at the COB in the amount of \$10,000,000. The increased need for security, conformance with building codes, upgrades to elevators, and contemporary construction escalation results in the need to increase the total bonding authorization for the project in the amount of \$9,900,000, from \$10,000,000 to \$19,900,000.

The bids have been reviewed by M/E Engineering, P.C., the design consultant, and were found to be acceptable in terms of scope. The Department of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion ("DEI") reviewed the Utilization Plans submitted by the low bidders and found all to be acceptable except that submitted by Landry Mechanical Contractors, Inc. ("Landry"). Several documented communications occurred between DEI and Landry which resulted in Landry failing to meet the criteria of Gantt's Law (Local Law No. 6-2021 adopted by Your Honorable Body) for meeting the Minority Business Enterprise ("MBE") utilization goals. DES, DEI, the Division of Purchasing and Central Services, and the Law Department met to review Landry's MBE Utilization Plan and determined Landry Mechanical Contractors, Inc. to be non-responsive to the public bid requirements. DEI reviewed the MBE Utilization Plan of the next low mechanical bid, submitted by Bell Mechanical Contractor, Inc., and found it to be acceptable. I recommend the award of construction contract to the lowest responsible bidders: Steve General Contractor, Inc. in the amount of \$2,092,000 for General Construction; Bell Mechanical Contractor, Inc., in the amount of \$6,594,400 for Mechanical Construction; and Concord Electric Corporation in the amount of \$2,530,000 for Electrical Construction.

This project is scheduled to be considered by the Monroe County Planning Board on September 26, 2024.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend the 2024-2029 Capital Improvement Program to expand the scope of the project entitled "County Office Building Reconstruction."
- 2. Amend the 2024 Capital Budget to increase funding for the County Office Building Reconstruction project in the amount of \$9,900,000.
- 3. Amend Bond Resolution 488 of 2021 to increase financing for the "County Office Building Reconstruction" project, capital fund 1850, in the amount of \$9,900,000, from \$10,000,000 to \$19,900,000, for a total project authorization of \$19,900,000.
- 4. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract with Steve General Contractor, Inc., 3774 Telephone Road, Caledonia, New York 14423 in the amount of \$2,092,000 for general construction services for the "County Office Building Reconstruction" project, and any amendments necessary to complete the project within the total capital fund(s) appropriation.
- 5. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract with Bell Mechanical Contractor, Inc., 105 Lincoln Parkway, East Rochester, New York 14445 in the amount of \$6,594,400 for mechanical construction services for the "County Office Building Reconstruction" project, and any amendments necessary to complete the project within the total capital fund(s) appropriation.
- 6. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract with Concord Electric Corporation, 305 Pinewild Drive, Suite 4, Rochester, New York 14606 in the amount of \$2,530,000 for electrical construction services for the "County Office Building Reconstruction" project, and any amendments necessary to complete the project within the total capital fund(s) appropriation.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(2) ("replacement, rehabilitation or reconstruction of a structure or facility, in kind, on the same site, including upgrading buildings to meet building, energy, or fire codes, unless such action meets or exceeds any of the thresholds in section 617.4 of this Part") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this project, consistent with authorized uses, will be available in capital fund 1850 once the additional financing authorization requested herein is approved, and in any capital fund(s) created for the same intended purpose. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$19,900,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE THE COST OF THE COUNTY OFFICE BUILDING RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT, IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$19,900,000 AND SUPERSEDING THE BOND RESOLUTION ADOPTED ON DECEMBER 14, 2021 (RESOLUTION NO. 488 OF 2021).

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the County Office Building Reconstruction Project, in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$19,900,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$9,900,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose (\$10,000,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is twenty-five (25) years, pursuant to subdivision 12(a)(1) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law, computed from June 30, 2021, the date of the first obligations issued therefor.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$19,900,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$19,900,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

<u>Section 3.</u> The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

<u>Section 4.</u> Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local

Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- 1) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and

an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or

3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 488 of 2021, being a bond resolution dated December 14, 2021, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following: to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$19,900,000, and to provide \$19,900,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$9,900,000 over the \$10,000,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 488 of 2021.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Section 9. This resolution shall take effect in accordance with Section C2-7 of the Monroe County Charter and the Clerk of the Legislature is hereby authorized and directed to publish this resolution or a summary hereof to be published, together with a notice attached in substantially the form and in the manner prescribed by Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

The RGE - Brockport MGP Site under the Voluntary Cleanup Program and is located approximately 1,700 feet southeast of the sidewalk project. Remedial actions have successfully achieved soil cleanup objectives for restricted-residential use. Residual contamination in the soil and groundwater is being managed under a Site Management Plan and Institutional controls.

The project does not impact the 100 year floodplain or any structures more than 50 years old. The project will not impact existing natural resources, historical or cultural resources and will not alter the existing community character or increase traffic. 

Honorable Legislators:

We recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize an intermunicipal agreement with the Village of Brockport (the "Village") for the West Avenue Sidewalk Extension Project, partially funded through Monroe County in an amount not to exceed \$177,500; appropriate committed fund balance; and authorize an interfund transfer.

The Village has submitted a Monroe County Municipal Sidewalk Funding Application to install approximately 2400 linear feet of sidewalk along West Avenue between Carolin Drive and Briar Rose Lane (the "Project"). The total construction costs are anticipated to be approximately \$355,000. Through the intermunicipal agreement, the County will reimburse the Village in an amount not to exceed \$177,500 for construction expenses. The \$177,500 of the County's share will be paid for by the appropriation and transfer of committed fund balance pursuant to Resolution 197 of 2023.

The Project will connect existing sidewalk networks serving this area and provide a continuous path between residential neighborhoods, town parks, and various retail and medical destinations. Such connections would further the goals of the County's Countywide Active Transportation Plan to fill gaps within the existing sidewalk network.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute an intermunicipal agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the Village of Brockport in an amount not to exceed \$177,500 for the West Avenue Sidewalk Extension Project.
- 2. Amend the 2024 operating budget of the Department of Finance-Unallocated by appropriating committed fund balance in the amount of \$177,500 into general fund 9001, funds center 1209030000, Transfer to Other Funds.

3. Authorize an interfund transfer in the amount of \$177,500 from the Department of Finance-Unallocated, general fund 9001, funds center 1209030000, Transfer to Other Funds, to the Department of Transportation, road fund 9002, funds center 8002060000, Sidewalk Projects.

The provisions of the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act shall be complied with prior to Your Honorable Body undertaking, funding, or approving the action requested in this referral.

Funding for this intermunicipal agreement will be available in the Department of Transportation, road fund 9002, funds center 8002060000, Sidewalk Projects once the interfund transfer has been authorized. This interfund transfer requires \$177,500 of additional net County support for which the appropriation of committed fund balance is requested.





Subject: Authorize an Intermunicipal Agreement with the Town of Mendon for the Mile Square Road Sidewalk Extension Project Partially Funded Through Monroe County; Appropriate Committed Fund Balance; and Authorize an Interfund Transfer

Honorable Legislators:

We recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize an intermunicipal agreement with the Town of Mendon (the "Town") for the Mile Square Road Sidewalk Extension Project, partially funded through Monroe County in an amount not to exceed \$130,000; appropriate committed fund balance; and authorize an interfund transfer.

The Town has submitted a Monroe County Municipal Sidewalk Funding Application to install approximately 2500 linear feet of sidewalk along Mile Square Road between Victor Mendon Road and Lehigh Valley Trail (the "Project"). The total construction costs are anticipated to be approximately \$260,000. Through the intermunicipal agreement, the County will reimburse the Town in an amount not to exceed \$130,000 for construction expenses. The \$130,000 of the County's share will be paid for by the appropriation and transfer of committed fund balance pursuant to Resolution 197 of 2023.

The Project will connect existing sidewalk networks serving this area and provide a continuous path between residential neighborhoods and the Lehigh Valley Trail. Such connections would further the goals of the County's Countywide Active Transportation Plan to fill gaps within the existing sidewalk network.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute an intermunicipal agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the Town of Mendon in an amount not to exceed \$130,000 for the Mile Square Road Sidewalk Extension Project.
- 2. Amend the 2024 operating budget of the Department of Finance-Unallocated by appropriating committed fund balance in the amount of \$130,000 into general fund 9001, funds center 1209030000, Transfer to Other Funds.

3. Authorize an interfund transfer in the amount of \$130,000 from the Department of Finance-Unallocated, general fund 9001, funds center 1209030000, Transfer to Other Funds, to the Department of Transportation, road fund 9002, funds center 8002060000, Sidewalk Projects.

This action is an Unlisted Action under the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"). The Town of Mendon will conduct a coordinated review and the provisions of SEQRA shall be complied with prior to Your Honorable Body undertaking, funding, or approving the action requested in this referral.

Funding for this intermunicipal agreement will be available in the Department of Transportation, road fund 9002, funds center 8002060000, Sidewalk Projects once the interfund transfer has been authorized. This interfund transfer requires \$130,000 of additional net County support for which the appropriation of committed fund balance is requested.

The Monroe County Legislature hereby authorizes an interfund transfer in the amount of \$130,000 from the Department of Finance-Unallocated, general fund 9001, funds center 1209030000, Transfer to Other Funds, to the Department of Transportation, road fund 9002, funds center 8002060000, Sidewalk Projects.

Section 4. Funding for this intermunicipal agreement will be available in the Department of Transportation, road fund 9002, funds center 8002060000, Sidewalk Projects once the interfund transfer has been authorized.

Section 5. This resolution shall take effect in accordance with Section C2-7 of the Monroe County Charter.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether the Town of Brighton Allens Creek Road, Edgewood Avenue, Elmwood Avenue and Westfall Road Sidewalk Extension Project, partially funded through Monroe County, may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

This project involves Monroe County providing funding to the Town of Brighton to install 6,300 +/- linear feet of ADA compliant, five-foot wide concrete sidewalk at four locations: 1. Elmwood Avenue (north side) between 2700 Elmwood Avenue and Highland Avenue (2,450 LF), 2. Westfall Road (north side) between Roosevelt Road and Monroe Avenue, Westfall Road (south side) between Del Rio and Edgewood Avenue (2,850 LF); 3. Edgewood Avenue (west side) between 17 Edgewood Avenue and Monroe Avenue (500 LF); 4. Allens Creek Road (north side) between Monroe Avenue and Schoolhouse Lane (800 LF).

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Determine that the Town of Brighton Allens Creek Road, Edgewood Avenue, Elmwood Avenue and Westfall Road Sidewalk Extension Project is an Unlisted Action.
- 2. Make a determination of significance regarding the Town of Brighton Allens Creek Road, Edgewood Avenue, Elmwood Avenue and Westfall Road Sidewalk Extension Project pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.7.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to take such actions to comply with the requirements of SEQRA, including without limitation, the execution of documents and the filing, distribution and publication of the documents required under SEQRA, and any other actions to implement the intent of this resolution.





The Town of Brighton 2024 Sidewalk Project involves installation of 6,300 +/- linear feet of ADA compliant, five-foot wide concrete sidewalk at four locations: 1. Elmwood Avenue (north side) between 2700 Elmwood Avenue and Highland Avenue (2,450 LF), 2. Westfall Road (north side) between Roosevelt Road and Monroe Avenue, Westfall Road (south side) between Del Rio and Edgewood Avenue (2,850 LF); 3. Edgewood Avenue (west side) between 17 Edgewood Avenue and Monroe Avenue (500 LF); 4. Allens Creek Road (north side) between Monroe Avenue and Schoolhouse Lane (800 LF).

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) EAF Mapper indicated that the sidewalk projects are near various environmental remediation sites. The Town and Country Dry Cleaners site is listed as a State Superfund Site and located approximately 750 feet northwest of the Edgewood sidewalk project, 1,350 feet north of the Westfall Road sidewalk project and 2,300 feet northwest of the Allens Creek Road sidewalk project. The remediation site will not impact these sidewalk projects as remedial actions are complete and measures are in place to control the potential for coming in contact with contamination remaining at the site. The Carriage Cleaners is a State Superfund Site and is located approximately 1,000 feet south of the Elmwood Avenue sidewalk project. This site will not impact the sidewalk project as remedial actions have successfully achieved soil cleanup objectives for commercial use. Residual contamination in the soil, groundwater, and indoor air is being managed under a Site Management Plan.

Portions of the Edgewood Avenue, Elmwood Avenue and Westfall Road project are in a 100 year floodplain, however the impact will be negligible as the sidewalks will be constructed in an already developed area adjacent to existing roads. The Allens Creek Road sidewalk project is not within a floodplain. These sidewalk projects do not impact any structures more than 50 years old. The projects will not impact existing natural resources, historical or cultural resources and will not alter the existing community character or increase traffic. The proposed actions are consistent with existing land use. Accordingly, the proposed actions will have no significant effect upon the environment and is determined to be a negative determination.

The Town of Brighton 2024 Sidewalk Project involves installation of 6,300 +/- linear feet of ADA compliant, five-foot wide concrete sidewalk at four locations: 1. Elmwood Avenue (north side) between 2700 Elmwood Avenue and Highland Avenue (2,450 LF), 2. Westfall Road (north side) between Roosevelt Road and Monroe Avenue, Westfall Road (south side) between Del Rio and Edgewood Avenue (2,850 LF); 3. Edgewood Avenue (west side) between 17 Edgewood Avenue and Monroe Avenue (500 LF); 4. Allens Creek Road (north side) between Monroe Avenue and Schoolhouse Lane (800 LF).

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) EAF Mapper indicated that the sidewalk projects are near various environmental remediation sites. The Town and Country Dry Cleaners site is listed as a State Superfund Site and located approximately 750 feet northwest of the Edgewood sidewalk project, 1,350 feet north of the Westfall Road sidewalk project and 2,300 feet northwest of the Allens Creek Road sidewalk project. The remediation site will not impact these sidewalk projects as remedial actions are complete and measures are in place to control the potential for coming in contact with contamination remaining at the site. The Carriage Cleaners is a State Superfund Site and is located approximately 1,000 feet south of the Elmwood Avenue sidewalk project. This site will not impact the sidewalk project as remedial actions have successfully achieved soil cleanup objectives for commercial use. Residual contamination in the soil, groundwater, and indoor air is being managed under a Site Management Plan.

Portions of the Edgewood Avenue, Elmwood Avenue and Westfall Road project are in a 100 year floodplain, however the impact will be negligible as the sidewalks will be constructed in an already developed area adjacent to existing roads. The Allens Creek Road sidewalk project is not within a floodplain. These sidewalk projects do not impact any structures more than 50 years old. The projects will not impact existing natural resources, historical or cultural resources and will not alter the existing community character or increase traffic. The proposed actions are consistent with existing land use. Accordingly, the proposed actions will have no significant effect upon the environment and is determined to be a negative determination.



Through the intermunicipal agreement, the County will reimburse the Town in an amount not to exceed \$893,500 for construction expenses. The \$893,500 of the County's share will be paid for by the appropriation and transfer of committed fund balance pursuant to Resolution 197 of 2023.

The Project will connect existing sidewalk networks serving this area and provide a continuous path between residential neighborhoods, schools, town parks, places of worship, and various retail and tourist destinations, including the Auburn Trail. Such connections would further the goals of the County's Countywide Active Transportation Plan to fill gaps within the existing sidewalk network.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute an intermunicipal agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the Town of Brighton in an amount not to exceed \$893,500 for the Allens Creek Road, Edgewood Avenue, Elmwood Avenue and Westfall Road Sidewalk Extension Project.



Honorable Legislators:



Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 155 of 2021 to increase and extend the contracts with the County of Monroe Industrial Development Agency from the amount of \$200,000 to the amount of \$333,895 for general planning services, and Environmental Design & Research, Landscape Architecture, Engineering & Environmental Services, DPC ("EDR") from the amount of \$184,953 to the amount of \$318,848 for professional consulting services for the Monroe County Comprehensive Plan, and to extend the contract period through December 31, 2026, with the option to extend for one (1) year at no additional cost.

Monroe County's last Comprehensive Plan was adopted over forty years ago. The updated Comprehensive Plan will be a blueprint that guides decision-making for the County, its municipalities, and its residents for years to come. The Plan process will lead to a community-inspired vision, community supported goals, and implementable strategies to guide policy and investment within and throughout the County.

The additional funding is essential for expanding public engagement and enabling the project team to address critical issues such as public safety, public health, workforce development, and other emerging concerns within the County. An extension of the contract and the provision of these additional funds is necessary for EDR to finalize the Comprehensive Plan and ensure that the Plan meets the needs and priorities of the community.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. The Operations Center provides efficient traffic operations and congestion management at local signalized intersections through the Intelligent Transportation System, which is a combination of a centralized traffic signal system and a network of closed circuit traffic monitoring cameras. This system allows the Operations Center to provide reliable and consistent traffic signal operation, continuously monitor traffic conditions, and make real time adjustments to the traffic signal operation to accommodate changes in traffic flow and in response to traffic incidents.
