RE: Memorializing Governor Kathy Hochul and the New York State Legislature to Create a Task Force on Safety in School Transportation

Honorable Legislators,

School bus safety is crucial to ensuring the well-being of children as they travel to and from school. On average, one hundred school-aged children die in school-transportation-related crashes every year. Many of these fatalities occur outside the bus, often during the dangerous moments when children are crossing the street in front of or behind the vehicle.

Illegal passing of school buses, which happens roughly 95,000 times a day in the United States, puts children at a high risk for pedestrian accidents. Efforts to enhance safety are vital to protect students. Monroe County has been a leader in school bus safety; through the Monroe County School Bus Safety Program, more than 575 buses across several school districts have been equipped with sensors to actively monitor for vehicles illegally passing school buses.

However, safety concerns surpass illegal passing. Many school buses are aging and lack modern safety features as basic as seat belts. New York State Assembly Bill A.00233 would create a task force within the Department of Education with the purpose of reviewing and promoting safety in school transportation. This task force would evaluate current safety measures, make recommendations concerning new safety technology and prospective vehicle upgrades, and address other critical concerns to student safety.

The creation of this task force would help guarantee that school transportation policies are continuously evaluated and improved. With the potential for long-term positive impacts, the task force will work to ensure that New York's school transportation system is as safe as possible, not just today but for years to come. The recommendations and findings generated by the task force will serve as a foundation for future legislative action, and a biannual review of all aspects of school bus safety will ensure the safety of our school buses remains a priority.

Additionally, A.00233 calls for the development of strategies to support safe walking behaviors for students traveling to and from bus stops. This focus on pedestrian safety is particularly important for younger students, who are more vulnerable to accidents. Further, the task force would identify safety protocols to be followed by school bus drivers, determine best

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practices for the designation of school bus stops, and decide if there is a need for additional public education programs promoting school bus safety.

In a time when transportation-related accidents are a growing concern, this bill addresses the pressing need to strengthen safety measures and reduce risks for students traveling to and from school. If passed, the bill will provide a comprehensive approach to improving school transportation safety, benefiting students, families, and communities across the state.

We encourage the State Senate to introduce a companion bill, the State Assembly to pass A.00233, and Governor Hochul to sign it into law.

RE: Memorializing the President of the United States to Rescind Executive Orders 14163 and 14169, and Urges the United States Congress to Pass the Afghan Adjustment Act

Honorable Legislators,

The United States has a moral obligation to support Afghan allies, including interpreters, human rights defenders, and their families, who provided critical assistance to U.S. troops, diplomats, and humanitarian efforts during two decades of engagement in Afghanistan. Since the withdrawal from Afghanistan, over 195,000 Afghans have resettled safely in the United States, many of whom are still navigating complex immigration pathways while making vital contributions to the economy and culture of their new communities.

The Afghan Adjustment Act, though widely supported, has not yet been passed by Congress, leaving many Afghans without a clear pathway to permanent residency or citizenship despite their sacrifices and service to the United States. Veterans, military families, frontline civilians, and humanitarian organizations across the United States have come together to assist Afghan allies, but these efforts cannot continue without sustained federal support and funding.

The Executive Order Realigning the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program (USRAP) (Executive Order 14163) explicitly assigns joint authority to the Secretary of Homeland Security and the Secretary of State to approve or deny exemptions for refugee processing. Furthermore, the Executive Order Realigning and Reevaluating Foreign Aid (Executive Order 14169) explicitly assigns sole authority to the Secretary of State to approve or deny exemptions for the pause on foreign aid. The federal government's Executive Orders 14163 and 14169 have halted Enduring Welcome Afghan relocation and resettlement, creating

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undue hardship for Afghans and jeopardizing the national honor and security commitments made to these allies.

Enduring Welcome travelers undergo even more rigorous vetting than other refugee populations, meeting heightened security clearance standards through multi-agency screening processes that exceed standard U.S. Refugee Admissions Program (USRAP) and special immigrant visa (SIV) protocols. Restoring adequate resources and pathways for Afghan relocation and resettlement not only fulfills a moral and ethical duty but also strengthens our communities, aligns with national security interests, and upholds America's reputation as a country that honors its promises.

Failure to grant exemptions for Enduring Welcome travelers not only jeopardizes the safety of these allies but also risks undermining national security by weakening global partnerships and discouraging cooperation with U.S. military and diplomatic missions in future conflicts.

Therefore, we echo the following statements:

- 1. Urges the federal government to immediately restore and increase access to resettlement through all referral pathways, including USRAP refugee referrals, private sponsorship, and Special Immigrant Visas (SIVs) for Afghans eligible under Enduring Welcome;
- 2. Calls on the Secretary of State to exercise the authority granted under Executive Order 14169 to approve the resumption of all Enduring Welcome relocation services, including those funded through U.S. foreign aid and other federal refugee assistance programs;
- 3. Calls on the Secretary of Homeland Security and the Secretary of State to exercise the authority granted under Executive Order 14163 to approve a categorical exemption for all Enduring Welcome travelers within 60 days, recognizing that their heightened security vetting already meets or exceeds the requirements for other refugee groups. Ensuring these exemptions is critical to national security and U.S. diplomatic commitments, preventing future recruitment by adversaries who use abandonment of allies as propaganda;
- 4. Calls on the U.S. Congress to pass the Afghan Adjustment Act by the end of the current legislative session, providing a permanent pathway to residency and citizenship for eligible Afghan evacuees and ensuring a stable and fair immigration process;
- 5. Calls on the Executive Branch of the United States to immediately restore full funding for Enduring Welcome relocation and resettlement programs, including:
 - The Department of State's U.S. Refugee Admissions Program (USRAP) for Afghan refugees still in third countries, including the Virtual Placement program.
 - The Department of Homeland Security's SIV and humanitarian parole adjudication efforts, ensuring timely processing.
 - The Department of Health and Human Services' Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) programs, which provide essential integration services.

We urge President Trump to rescind Executive Orders 14163 and 14169, and ask the United States Congress to pass the Afghan Adjustment Act to protect the people who fought alongside our nation's heroes and protected democracy.

RE: Memorializing the New York State Legislature to Pass the Get Around NY Act

Honorable Legislators,

Carbon emissions, primarily in the form of carbon dioxide, are a significant driver of climate change, as they trap heat within the Earth's atmosphere. This leads to global warming, rising sea levels, extreme weather events, and loss of biodiversity. Reducing carbon emissions is essential for mitigating the impacts of climate change and ensuring a sustainable future for all New Yorkers.

New York's transportation system is a major contributor to the state's carbon footprint. The **Get Around NY Act** provides a vital opportunity to take meaningful action in reducing vehicle miles traveled, curbing carbon emissions, and addressing climate change.

This bill, which amends the Highway Law and Village Law, introduces a bold approach to tackling the state's transportation-related emissions and congestion. By mandating a Comprehensive Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) Assessment for highway projects, New York aims to cut vehicle miles traveled by 20% by 2050.

Vehicle miles traveled is a critical indicator of both traffic congestion and emissions. Under the **Get Around NY Act**, all highway capacity expansion projects, including the construction of new highways and the widening of existing roads, will require a VMT assessment. Should a proposed project fail to meet the 20% reduction target by 2050, it will either need to be redesigned or incorporate substantial mitigation measures to offset its environmental impact.

This bill would further create a working group tasked with exploring best practices and strategies to assess and reduce VMT across New York State. This group will include representatives from critical state agencies, including the Department of Transportation, the Department of Environmental Conservation, and the New York

Metropolitan Transportation Authority, as well as advocates for alternative transportation options such as public transit, cycling infrastructure, and pedestrian pathways.

Additionally, the bill establishes a technical advisory committee composed of experts in travel demand modeling, traffic forecasting, and transportation-related greenhouse gas emissions. This committee will provide crucial guidance on the methodologies and tools used to assess and mitigate the impacts of highway expansion projects.

The goal is clear: to significantly reduce vehicle miles traveled by minimizing the need for additional vehicles on the road and promoting sustainable transportation alternatives.

We urge lawmakers to support this landmark legislation, which presents a clear pathway to a more sustainable transportation future for New York State. The **Get Around NY Act** has the potential to reshape our approach to highway projects, positioning New York as a leader in sustainable and climate-conscious transportation policy.

Memorializing the New York State Legislature and Governor Kathy Hochul to Support Correctional Officers and Repeal the HALT Act by Passing and Signing Bill S2656/A3217

Honorable Legislators:

New York State Correctional Officers are on the front lines of public safety, working in some of the most dangerous environments imaginable. They are tasked with maintaining order in prisons that house some of the most violent offenders in the state, yet they do so with little support from Albany. Instead of policies that empower them to keep our correctional facilities safe, they have been burdened with legislation that ties their hands, limits their ability to discipline violent inmates, and forces them to work under increasingly dangerous conditions. The disastrous Humane Alternatives to Long-Term Solitary Confinement (HALT) Act, which was enacted in 2022, has led to an explosion of violence inside state-run prisons, putting both officers and inmates at greater risk. Meanwhile, chronic understaffing and mandatory overtime have turned working in New York's correctional facilities into an unsustainable and outright dangerous job. The time for excuses and political posturing is over. The Legislature and Governor Hochul must take immediate action to repeal the HALT Act and enact policies that support the men and women who put their lives on the line to protect our communities – failure to do so will cost someone their life.

The facts about prison violence in New York since the HALT Act was enacted are undeniable. According to official reports from the New York State Department of Corrections and Community Supervision (DOCCS), assaults on Correctional Officers have increased by 76% since HALT was signed into law, rising from an average of 93 per month in 2021 to 173 per month in 2024. Inmate-on-inmate violence has surged by 169%, with recorded incidents skyrocketing from 1,110 in 2021 to 2,983 in 2024. Officers are being attacked at historic rates, and violent offenders are emboldened by a system that no longer holds them accountable for their actions. These numbers do not lie—they prove that HALT has failed and that its repeal is a matter of life and death for those working in our prisons.

The staffing crisis in correctional facilities has compounded these dangers. New York prisons are operating at dangerously low staffing levels, with some facilities reporting shortages of up to 30% fewer officers than needed to run a shift safely. These vacancies are not just numbers on a page they represent the overworked, exhausted, and vulnerable officers who are forced into mandatory overtime just to keep facilities functioning. Some officers are working shifts that extend past 24 consecutive hours with little to no time for rest or recuperation. This is not just unfair—it is unsustainable and dangerous. Fatigued officers cannot effectively respond to emergencies, and inmates recognize this as an opportunity to take advantage of weakened enforcement. Rather than addressing this crisis, Albany's policies have driven officers out of the profession, creating a worsening cycle of short staffing, dangerous overtime, and increased risk.

Adding insult to injury, the State's refusal to support these officers has already led to crippling financial consequences for taxpayers. The deployment of National Guard members and emergency staffing measures to maintain prison operations due to officer shortages has been estimated to cost upwards of \$3.5 million per day—a completely unnecessary burden that could have been avoided had state leadership simply listened to the men and women working inside these facilities. Instead of acknowledging their failures, Albany Democrats have doubled down on their disastrous policies, choosing to protect violent criminals over Correctional Officers and wasting taxpayer money in the process.

The HALT Act, sold to the public as a "reform," has endangered lives and emboldened the worst of the worst inside our prisons. This law severely limits the ability of officers to remove violent inmates from the general population, forcing them to endure attacks while their hands are tied by Albany bureaucrats who have never set foot inside a prison. The idea that these violent offenders should be coddled rather than held accountable is an insult to every officer who has suffered an assault due to these reckless policies. The men and women inside these facilities every day know better than any out-of-touch politician what is needed to maintain safety, and they have spoken loudly: HALT is a failure, and it must be repealed immediately.

Therefore, we urge you to join us, the members of the Republican Conference of the Monroe County Legislature, in calling on the New York State Legislature and Governor Kathy Hochul to support correctional officers in the state by improving working conditions, including hiring a sufficient number of Correctional Officers to fully staff all shifts, limiting mandatory overtime, and repealing the HALT Act by passing and signing Bill S2656/A3217.

Honorable Legislators:

New York State encompasses a diverse landscape, including bustling urban centers like New York City, Albany, Buffalo, and Rochester, as well as expansive rural areas. Notably, 86% of New York's landmass is classified as rural, spanning approximately 40,907 square miles across 53 counties. These rural regions are home to more than 4.2 million residents, making up roughly 21.5% of the state's population. Income Tax Credit

Honorable Legislators:

New York State's economy has long been propelled by the industrious efforts of hardworking families, small businesses, and job creators who endeavor to build a stable and prosperous future. However, the state's notoriously high tax burden continues to stifle economic growth and hinder opportunities for workers to advance. According to the Tax Foundation, New Yorkers bear the highest state and local tax burden in the nation, with 15.9% of net product going to taxes.

The state's top marginal income tax rate stands at 10.9%, among the highest in the country. This oppressive tax environment has contributed to a significant exodus of residents. Since 2020, New York has lost approximately 884,000 residents to other states, leading the nation in population decline. Projections suggest that if these trends continue, the state's population could shrink by more than 2 million people over the next 25 years—a decline of over 13%.

Monroe County, home to nearly 800,000 residents and over 17,000 small businesses, is not immune to these economic challenges. Approximately 13.4% of our population—nearly 100,000 residents—live in poverty, exceeding the national average of 12.5%. Our largest demographic comprises young adults aged 18-34, many of whom are entering the workforce for the first time. It is imperative that we support these workers, create new job opportunities, and alleviate the crushing tax burden that hampers our state's economic vitality.

Senate Bill S1393 proposes a pragmatic solution by amending and expanding the Jobs Development Incentive Income Tax Credit. This legislation offers a 6% tax credit on wages paid to newly hired qualified employees during their first six months of employment. If the employee was receiving unemployment benefits for at least 13 weeks prior to being hired or is employed directly in manufacturing, the credit increases to 12%. The credit is capped at \$750 per employee

and \$1,500 for unemployed or manufacturing employees. This fiscally responsible incentive would encourage businesses to hire more workers, stimulate economic growth, and ensure that New York remains competitive.

Too often, we witness businesses relocating to lower-tax states, taking jobs and economic opportunities with them. By incentivizing job creation within our own borders, this bill would help retain businesses, strengthen our workforce, and support those who need it most. Therefore, we urge you to join us in calling upon Governor Kathy Hochul and the New York State Legislature to adopt and sign Senate Bill \$1393. This legislation will provide meaningful relief for New York's working families, lower the cost of living, keep jobs in our communities, and ensure that our residents can build their futures right here in New York State.



Memorializing New York State Legislature to Pass and Governor Kathy Hochul to Sign Bills S.192/A.4369 in Relation to the Next Generation 911 System, an Emergency Services Internet Protocol Network

Honorable Legislators:

In our previous memorialization, we advocated for the passage of Bills S.4582-A/A.5942-A, which aimed to modernize New York State's emergency response infrastructure through the implementation of a Next Generation 911 (NG911) system. These bills have since been updated and reintroduced as S.192 in the Senate and A.4369 in the Assembly, reflecting advancements in technology and the evolving needs of our emergency services.

The NG911 system represents a significant upgrade from the outdated analog 911 infrastructure, transitioning to a modern, Internet Protocol (IP)-based framework. This advancement offers numerous benefits, including more accurate location tracking for mobile callers, the capability to receive and interpret text messages, and the establishment of a resilient Emergency Services Internet Protocol Network (ESInet) that connects Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) across counties. Such integration ensures that counties can share resources and provide mutual support, particularly during large-scale emergencies or natural disasters.

The proposed legislation, S.192/A.4369, mandates the development of a statewide ESInet designed for seamless interoperability among local PSAPs. This initiative addresses the current fragmentation within our emergency response systems, ensuring that neighboring counties can efficiently share resources and information when it is most critical. By codifying these requirements into law, the state acknowledges the necessity of a unified approach to emergency communications.

Recognizing the financial implications of this transition, the state has allocated substantial funding to support local governments. Governor Kathy Hochul recently announced \$55 million in grants awarded to 57 counties and New York City to bolster emergency response and communications systems. These funds are intended to assist counties in acquiring new equipment,

upgrading technology, improving training, and developing NG911 technologies. This financial support is crucial in alleviating the burden on local governments and taxpayers, ensuring that the 911 system in New York is efficient, effective, and prepared for future challenges.

The NG911 system also addresses current challenges faced by 911 centers, including funding constraints, staffing issues, high call volumes, and the need to assist individuals with special needs. By integrating new communication technologies, NG911 enhances the ability of emergency services to respond promptly and effectively. The proposed legislation ensures that the ESInet can handle various forms of communication—calls, texts, and other media—from the public to 911, thereby improving accessibility and response times.

Therefore, we urge you to join us in calling upon the New York State Legislature and Governor Kathy Hochul to enact bills S.192/A.4369 into law. This legislation will provide faster response times, improved communications, and increased accessibility, leading to a more efficient use of our resources. Together, we can ensure that our 911 system is ready to meet the challenges of tomorrow, enhancing public safety and saving lives when every second counts.

Memorializing The New York State Legislature to Pass and Governor Kathy Hochul to Sign Senate Bill S1293 "Prevent the Financial Exploitation of Older and Vulnerable Adults"

Honorable Legislators:

One of our primary duties as elected officials is to protect the well-being and financial security of our older and vulnerable citizens. New York State is home to over 3.6 million seniors, ranking fourth in the nation for senior population—a demographic that continues to grow each year, according to the U.S. Census Bureau (2023). Alarmingly, elder financial exploitation has become one of the most pervasive yet underreported forms of elder abuse, often referred to by experts as "the crime of the 21st century." According to the National Council on Aging (2023), financial exploitation of older adults results in estimated annual losses of \$36.5 billion nationwide, affecting millions of victims each year.

The scale of elder financial exploitation continues to escalate. The Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI) latest Elder Fraud Report (2023) revealed that elder fraud complaints increased by 14% nationwide in 2023, with total losses climbing by 11% from the previous year. Even more troubling, experts estimate that fewer than one in 44 cases of financial abuse against older adults is reported to authorities, highlighting how insidious and widespread this crime truly is. Specifically, New York State is particularly vulnerable, ranking fifth nationally for the number of complaints filed by victims over 60 years old and fourth in total monetary losses within this age group, according to the FBI Internet Crime Complaint Center (2023). Some of the most common scams targeting older adults include government impersonation, sweepstakes, tech support scams, robocalls, and grandparent scams, many of which require payments via cash or untraceable money transfers, making recovery nearly impossible.

Monroe County, home to more than 183,969 seniors—approximately 25% of the county's total population—is especially at risk. Projections indicate Monroe County's senior population will surpass 215,000 by 2030, further amplifying the urgency of robust protective measures, according to the Monroe County Office for the Aging (2023). Victims of financial scams and

exploitation often suffer devastating consequences, losing their entire life savings with limited options to recover financially. This frequently results in increased reliance on public assistance programs, diminished independence, and significant emotional distress, including depression, anxiety, and profound feelings of betrayal and isolation.

Senate Bill S1293 offers a critical solution by empowering financial institutions to take immediate action when financial exploitation is suspected. The bill authorizes banks, investment firms, and other financial institutions to place temporary holds on transactions when there is reasonable belief that exploitation is occurring. It further requires these institutions to promptly report suspected exploitation to the Department of Financial Services and local law enforcement agencies, thereby enabling timely intervention and investigation, according to the New York State Senate (2024). Additionally, the legislation mandates specialized training for financial professionals, equipping them with the skills necessary to detect early signs of exploitation and ensuring swift, informed responses when red flags arise.

Public support for these preventive measures is both overwhelming and bipartisan. A 2024 AARP survey of New York voters aged 45 and older revealed that 86% believe elder financial exploitation is a serious problem. Furthermore, 88% expressed support for legislation empowering financial institutions to hold transactions in cases of suspected fraud. Nationally, another AARP survey (2024) found that 92% of older adults favor mandatory training for financial institution employees to identify and prevent financial exploitation, and 67% stated they would preferentially patronize banks or credit unions actively addressing elder fraud issues.

The implementation of Senate Bill S1293 would enable financial institutions to become an essential line of defense, significantly reducing the likelihood of successful financial exploitation schemes. By allowing banks and financial professionals to intervene at critical moments, this legislation offers proactive protection rather than reactive remediation after a victim has already lost their savings.

Therefore, we urge you to join us in calling upon the New York State Legislature to promptly pass, and Governor Kathy Hochul to swiftly sign, Senate Bill S1293. This legislation represents a meaningful and effective step towards safeguarding our older residents, many of whom have dedicated their lives to building families, homes, and communities within our state. It is our collective responsibility to ensure these valued citizens enjoy a retirement characterized by financial security, dignity, and peace of mind. Let us act decisively to protect their hard-earned assets and demonstrate our unwavering commitment to their well-being.

Memorializing the New York State Legislature and Governor Kathy Hochul to Pass and Sign Bill S1850/A6012, "Relates to Establishing the Safe Water

Infrastructure Action Program"

Honorable Legislators:

Bill S1850/A6012, sponsored by Senator Michelle Hinchey and Assemblymember Anna Kelles, would establish the Safe Water Infrastructure Action Program (SWAP) to address the aging water, sewer, and stormwater infrastructure in New York State. With approximately 80% of the state's water infrastructure in need of repair, replacement, or rehabilitation, this legislation would provide funding to municipalities to ensure they can maintain and upgrade their systems. This program would have a formula to be developed by the State Department of Health similar to that of the Consolidated Local Street and Highway Improvement Program (CHIPS), where counties, cities, towns, villages, and public authorities are provided with quarterly payments based on: the length and width of pipes; other physical assets of a system including facilities and pumping stations; the age of a water system's infrastructure; and relevant socioeconomic factors such as disadvantaged communities within a system's service area. By creating a program similar to CHIPS, this bill recognizes that water infrastructure is just as important as roads and bridges to the well-being of communities and the economy. Without proper investment, municipalities will continue to struggle with costly emergency repairs and public health risks caused by failing water systems.

Investing in water infrastructure is not just a maintenance issue - it is essential for economic development. Businesses looking to expand or relocate require reliable water and sewer systems to operate efficiently. Without modernized infrastructure, municipalities will find it difficult to attract new businesses or support population growth, putting them at a competitive disadvantage compared to other states with better-maintained systems. This bill provides a structured and reliable funding source, ensuring that municipalities can plan long-term projects rather than relying on inconsistent or one-time grants.

Finally, the bill's reporting requirement ensures accountability and transparency in how funds are used. By requiring municipalities and public authorities to submit annual reports

detailing their expenditures, the program will help prevent waste and mismanagement while allowing the state to assess the impact of the funding. This level of oversight ensures that taxpayer dollars are spent efficiently and that municipalities remain committed to maintaining and improving their infrastructure. With a structured funding stream, a fair distribution formula, and built-in accountability measures, \$1850/A6012 is a necessary and responsible investment in the futures of New York State and its municipalities.

Therefore, I ask that you join me in calling on the New York State Legislature to pass and Governor Kathy Hochul to sign Bill S1850/A6012 "Relates to Establishing the Safe Water Infrastructure Action Program" to support long-term capital planning, affordable economic development, and clean water for all residents of New York State.

Re: Amending the Rules of the Legislature to Ensure Pending Legislation is Debated in Open Sessions of the Legislature

Honorable Legislators:

New York State law mandates that meetings of governmental bodies be open to the public, a requirement affirmed in Monroe County Charter §545-6. Conducting the public's business in an open forum is foundational to democracy and reflects our commitment to transparency and accountability.

However, recent practices in this Legislature have raised concerns about adherence to these principles. The use of secret caucus meetings to discuss and decide matters of public importance undermines the intent of open government laws. These meetings exclude the public, evade scrutiny, and diminish trust in our institution.

Within the past year, the County Executive's office has set up separate "briefings" with each caucus to discuss pending legislation involving American Rescue Plan Act spending, the Seneca Park Zoo expansion, and the appointment of a commissioner of public health. This practice effectively sidelines the public from critical discussions about the use of taxpayer funds, major capital projects, and key appointments. By the time these issues reach the public forum, the most meaningful discussion has already occurred behind closed doors, depriving our constituents of their right to observe and participate in their government.

In addition, the administration has abused caucus "briefings" by demanding that certain legislators be excluded. This further demeans the legislative process and democratic norms.

While state law exempts caucus meetings from open meetings requirements, there is nothing preventing Monroe County from strengthening its own transparency measures. We should follow the lead of other municipalities in New York, including Ithaca, and restrict conducting the public's business in caucus meetings.

This proposed amendment would forbid legislative caucuses from meeting with the County Administration to discuss legislation coming before the Legislature for a vote within 30 days, with the exception of legal settlements. Caucuses would remain free to meet to discuss any matter in private, including pending legislation. Leaders of caucuses could still meet with the administration to discuss pending legislation. Should legislators have

questions of the administration that legally cannot be discussed in open meetings, state law provides for executive sessions.

The proposed amendment reflects a straightforward premise: the public has a right to witness the deliberations and decisions that shape our community. By closing loopholes that allow for secrecy, this measure seeks to strengthen accountability and restore public confidence in our processes.

1. Section 1. Article II, Section 545-6 of the Rules of the Monroe County Legislature, entitled "Meetings to be Public" is hereby amended to read as follows:
545-6 Meetings to be public.
A. In accordance with the State Open Meetings Law, all meetings of the Legislature and its committees shall be open to the public, except when the Legislature or its committees shall meet in executive session, at which time all persons not authorized to attend such executive session shall be excluded. Adequate accommodations shall be made for the County Executive and other county officials and for representation of the news media.
B. Exemptions. Nothing contained in this section shall be construed as extending the provisions hereof to:
(1) Meetings of caucuses, with caucuses as defined by 545-36. This exemption shall not apply to meetings of caucuses at which the County Executive or any County officers, County agency heads or representatives of the County Administration are present to discuss legislation that will come before a vote of a County Legislature Committee or the full Legislature within 30 days, with the exception of legislation pertaining to legal settlements.
(2) Any matter made confidential by federal or state law.
2. Section 2. This resolution shall take effect immediately in accordance with Section C2-7 of the Monroe County Charter.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a grant agreement with the State of New York to accept financial assistance related to two (2) projects at the Frederick Douglass - Greater Rochester International Airport.

This project involves the replacement of incandescent light fixtures with LED light fixtures on twelve (12) high mast light poles on the Terminal Apron and North Ramp. The existing high mast poles and their foundations will be visually inspected and assessed for any weathering and wear. Thickness gauge measurements will be taken at each pole to identify any potential material thinning.

This project will be funded by a Federal Aviation Administration grant of 90%, a New York State Department of Transportation grant of 5%, and a local share of 5%.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept three (3) grants from the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority ("NYSERDA") in the amounts of \$10,000 for the 1 Star Designation Clean Energy Communities Grant, \$125,000 for the period of December 1, 2024 through December 1, 2027 for the 2 Star Designation Clean Energy Communities Grant, and \$150,000 for the period of January 1, 2025 through January 1, 2028 for the 3 Star Designation Clean Energy Communities Grant to support the purchase of electric vehicles and equipment.

Monroe County was awarded three (3) grants for increasing electric vehicle purchases as part of an initiative by NYSERDA to provide resources for projects aimed at addressing climate change and its effects. This project complements the goals established in the Monroe County Climate Action Plan, Phase I (Resolution 276 of 2022) and adopted as part of the Climate Smart Communities pledge (Resolution 260 of 2020). Completion of these projects will further Monroe County's goal of achieving Silver Certification, the highest level in the program.

The Monroe County Department of Environmental Services will lead the project funded by this grant and administer the grant requirements, and coordinate with the Aviation and Parks Departments to facilitate deployment of the new electric vehicles and equipment.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$10,000 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority for the 1 Star Designation Clean Energy Communities Grant to support the purchase of electric vehicles and equipment.
- 2. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$125,000 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority for the period of December 1, 2024 through December 1, 2027 for the 2 Star Designation Clean Energy Communities Grant to support the purchase of electric vehicles and equipment.

- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$150,000 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority for the period of January 1, 2025 through January 1, 2028 for the 3 Star Designation Clean Energy Communities Grant to support the purchase of electric vehicles and equipment.
- 4. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Environmental Services by appropriating the sum of \$285,000 into general fund 9300, funds center 8301020000, Climate Initiatives.
- 5. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
- 6. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2025-2030 Capital Improvement Program to advance the Traffic Signal and Systems Replacement-Group 1 Project from 2026 to 2025; amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding for the project entitled "Traffic Signal and Systems Replacement-Group 1" by \$2,750,000 for a total project authorization of \$3,030,000, and amend Bond Resolution 116 of 2023 to increase financing for the project by \$2,750,000, from \$280,000 to \$3,030,000.

This project involves the replacement of seven traffic signals at various locations in the City of Rochester and Town of Greece. The signals to be replaced are located on Dewey Avenue at: Denise Road, English Road, Britton Road, Maiden Lane, and Stone Road, and on Ridgeway Avenue at Mount Read Boulevard and at LaGrange Avenue. The project will include replacement of underground conduit, mast arm signal poles, pedestrian signal upgrades, replacement of non-compliant sidewalk ramps, and installation of video vehicle detection. The project was originally scheduled for construction in 2026, however, the current schedule is to start construction in spring of 2025 with completion by fall 2025. The current total project estimate is \$3,030,000.

Major funding will be provided by Federal funds in the amount of approximately 95% of the project cost with overall project administration by Monroe County.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2025-2030 Capital Improvement Program to expand the scope of and to advance the Turk Hill Road Bridge Over Thomas Creek Tributary project from 2027 to 2025; amend the 2025 Capital Budget to add a project entitled "Turk Hill Road Bridge Over Thomas Creek Tributary" in the amount of \$939,000; authorize financing for the project in the amount of \$939,000; and authorize contracts with Colliers Engineering & Design, Architecture, Landscape Architecture, Surveying, CT P.C. in the amount of \$446,129.33 for engineering services and the New York State Department of Transportation for the Turk Hill Road Bridge Over Thomas Creek Tributary project in the Town of Perinton.

The Turk Hill Road Bridge is County owned and spans the Thomas Creek Tributary in the Town of Perinton. The project involves the rehabilitation or replacement of the bridge along with highway approach and channel improvements. The current schedule is to conduct preliminary engineering and final design during the years 2025-2026 with an anticipated construction start in 2027.

The estimated project cost was re-evaluated to account for the need to reconstruct the bridge one side at a time to maintain traffic on the other half during construction, which increased the estimate significantly. This is necessary due to the lack of an adequate detour route that would avoid sending thousands of vehicles daily through the Village of Fairport. The current total project estimate is \$5,369,000.

Major funding will be provided by Federal funds in the amount of approximately 95% of the project cost with overall project administration by Monroe County.

Monroe County was recently awarded Federal funding for this project through the Bridge NY program. New York State requires that construction of the project begin no later than two (2) years after award and that the project be completed within three (3) years of commencing construction.

Several consultants were considered, with Colliers Engineering & Design, Architecture, Landscape Architecture, Surveying, CT P.C. rated the most qualified for this project.

This program allows the Laboratory to continue to provide timely services to the region's law enforcement community and judicial system. This is the nineteenth year that the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents an increase of \$64,862 from the previous grant.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services for Criminal Justice Discovery Reform Funding in the amount of \$2,555,905 for the District Attorney's Office and the Department of Public Safety, Office of Probation and Community Corrections.

This program provides resources to support local law enforcement agencies with expenses related to discovery and pretrial reforms that took effect on January 1, 2020. These reforms require prosecutors to share evidence in their possession soon after arraignment and well in advance of trial. Eligible expenses include administrative support, computer equipment, data connectivity, training and related materials, overtime costs, litigation readiness, pre-trial services, and other discovery related expenses. This is the third year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents a decrease of \$100,150 from last year.

Funds will be used to help support the following programs in the following departments:

- District Attorney's Office: Supports or partially supports sixteen (16) existing Criminal Law Assistant
 positions, five (5) existing Digital Services positions and one (1) existing Confidential Clerk who
 serves as the Computer Systems Administrator. Provides funding for hardware and software fees

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the Genesee Transportation Council in the amount of \$45,000 for the Monroe County High Accident Location Program for the period of April 1, 2025 through March 31, 2026.

The Monroe County High Accident Location Program consists of a detailed analysis of each location identified as a Priority Investigation Location, identifying and evaluating potential countermeasures, and developing specific safety recommendations. Both the County and City road network are included in this program. Locations, if not recently studied for some other purpose, are analyzed to determine if there are any accident patterns, how persistent they are, what may have caused the accidents, and what countermeasures may be appropriate to improve safety at the location. This is an active program for Monroe County to monitor the safety performance of the road network.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding for the projects entitled "Network Infrastructure" by \$1,000,000, from \$8,300,000 to \$9,300,000, and "Office Equipment Refresh and Replacement" by \$2,500,000, from \$11,500,000 to \$14,000,000, and to decrease funding for the project entitled "ERP/Security" by \$3,500,000, from \$8,570,000 to \$5,070,000, and authorize interfund transfers.

The \$1,000,000 increase for the Network Infrastructure project is needed to support the higher cost and accelerated replacement schedule of several network components, including a VxRail server, the addition of new and replacement of old primary firewall routers, and the replacement of aggregate switches.

The \$2,500,000 increase for the Office Equipment Refresh and Replacement project is needed to support the county-wide replacement of employee laptop and desktop hardware. The higher cost of this replacement project is largely driven by the shift toward more remote/hybrid work schedules that are better supported by laptop hardware rather than desktop hardware.

Each of the above increases can be supported and offset by an aggregate \$3,500,000 decrease and transfer from the ERP/Security project. Cash contributions to the ERP/Security project for the past several years have not been fully utilized, and it is foreseen that the transition from SAP to Workday will require reduced annual funding.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding for the project entitled "Network Infrastructure" by \$1,000,000, from \$8,300,000 to \$9,300,000, for a total project authorization of \$9,300,000.
- 2. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding for the project entitled "Office Equipment Refresh and Replacement" by \$2,500,000, from \$11,500,000 to \$14,000,000 for a total project authorization of \$14,000,000.
- 3. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to decrease funding for the project entitled "ERP/Security" by \$3,500,000, from \$8,570,000 to \$5,070,000, for a total project authorization of \$5,070,000.
- 4. Authorize an interfund transfer in the amount of \$1,000,000 from capital fund 1815, ERP/Security, to capital fund 1816, Network Infrastructure.
- 5. Authorize an interfund transfer in the amount of \$2,500,000 from capital fund 1815, ERP/Security, to capital fund 1817, Office Equipment Refresh and Replacement.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize intermunicipal agreements with Monroe County public school districts and the Board of Cooperative Education Services ("BOCES 1 & 2") for the purpose of issuing matching grants for a Food Waste Diversion Grant Pilot Program ("Pilot Program") in a maximum aggregate value of \$50,000.

Diverting organic waste away from landfills and out of sewers is an important climate action to reduce methane, a potent greenhouse gas. The 18 public school districts and BOCES 1 & 2 within Monroe County can have a role in food waste diversion by:

- Reducing, recovering, and recycling food waste.
- Educating the next generation on environmental stewardship.
- Expanding the circular economy by supporting local composting and food waste diversion businesses.
- Donating excess food to those in need.
- Engaging faculty, staff, and administrations in environmental program implementation.

The Pilot Program will provide the 18 public school districts and BOCES 1 & 2 the opportunity to receive matching funds of up to \$5,000 to implement new initiatives to divert food waste as well as support or expand existing food waste diversion programs. The maximum aggregate value of the funding program is \$50,000. Applicants will be required to submit a proposed food waste diversion plan. Every funding recipient will be solely responsible for the means and methods to implement its approved food waste diversion plan and submit semiannual reports over the duration of funding. Funding will be available to support food waste diversion programs through the 2025-2026 academic year.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute intermunicipal agreements, and any amendments thereto, with Monroe County public school districts and the Board of Cooperative Education Services (BOCES 1 & 2) for the purpose of issuing matching grants for a Food Waste Diversion Grant Pilot Program ("Pilot Program") in a maximum aggregate value of \$50,000.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services in the amount of \$58,159 for the Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Program (Office of the Medical Examiner's Forensic Toxicology Laboratory) for the period of October 1, 2024 through December 31, 2025.

The purpose of this grant is to improve forensic science services in the Monroe County Office of the Medical Examiner's Forensic Toxicology Laboratory. This program provides postmortem forensic toxicology services to aid in the determination of cause and manner of deaths and toxicology services to aid in the evaluation of cases of driving under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol and drug-facilitated sexual assault. The funds will be used to maintain the Laboratory's accreditation, train staff, increase the analytical capacity of the Laboratory, and purchase supplies needed to minimize testing downtimes. This will be the twenty-second year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents an increase of \$726 from last year. This funding varies annually and is dependent on the total amount of federal funds available and the number of forensic laboratories in New York State eligible to receive funds.

We recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize an intermunicipal agreement with the Town of Clarkson (the "Town") for the East Avenue Sidewalk Extension Project, partially funded through Monroe County in an amount not to exceed \$223,000; appropriate committed fund balance; and authorize an interfund transfer.

The Town has submitted a Monroe County Municipal Sidewalk Funding Application to install approximately 2100 linear feet of sidewalk along East Avenue between Mission Hill Drive/Havenwood Drive and Wedgewood Court/Anita's Lane (the "Project"). The total construction costs are anticipated to be approximately \$446,000. Through the intermunicipal agreement, the County will reimburse the Town in an amount not to exceed \$223,000 for construction expenses. The \$223,000 of the County's share will be paid for by the appropriation and transfer of committed fund balance pursuant to Resolution 197 of 2023.

The Project will connect existing sidewalk networks serving this area and provide a continuous path between residential neighborhoods and various destinations within the Clarkson community. Such connections would further the goals of the Town of Clarkson 2022 Comprehensive Plan as well as the County's Countywide Active Transportation Plan to fill gaps within the existing sidewalk network.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize amendments to the Monroe County/Monroe County Bar Association Plan Regarding the Conflict Defender's Office and Assigned Counsel Program pursuant to Section 722 of the New York State County Law.

The Monroe County/Monroe County Bar Association Plan Regarding the Conflict Defender's Office and Assigned Counsel Program ("the Plan") is a cooperative effort between Monroe County and the Monroe County Bar Association for the provision of high quality legal services to eligible public defense clients. The Monroe County Conflict Defender's Office and Assigned Counsel Program operate under the provisions of the Plan. In 2023, Your Honorable Body approved an updated Plan that created separate, independent offices for the Conflict Defender and Assigned Counsel program, which had previously operated as a single office. That update ensured that Monroe County was compliant with the Standards for Establishing and Administering Assigned Counsel Programs adopted by the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services ("ILS").

ILS subsequently requested several minor changes to the Plan. These changes include strengthening language which permits legal representation prior to court filings in both Criminal and Family Court cases, clarification of who may sit on the Assigned Counsel Program Advisory Committee and its duties, and simplifying the process by which assigned counsel attorneys utilize specialists to assist with their cases. ILS and the Board of Trustees of the Monroe County Bar Association have already approved the updated Plan. A copy of the proposed updated Plan is on file in the office of the Clerk of the Legislature.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize amendments to the Monroe County/Monroe County Bar Association Plan Regarding the Conflict Defender's Office and Assigned Counsel Program, as approved by the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services and Monroe County Bar Association, pursuant to Section 722 of the New York State County Law.

The legislative action requested in this referral is not an "Action," as that term is defined in 6 NYCRR § 617.2(b), and is not subject to review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

THE MONROE COUNTY/MONROE COUNTY BAR ASSOCIATION PLAN REGARDING THE CONFLICT DEFENDER'S OFFICE AND ASSIGNED COUNSEL PROGRAM









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I. INTRODUCTION

The Monroe County/Monroe County Bar Association Plan Regarding the Conflict Defender's Office and Assigned Counsel Program ("the Plan") is a cooperative effort between Monroe County ("the County") and the Monroe County Bar Association ("the Bar" or "the Bar Association") for the provision of high quality legal services to eligible public defense clients. Eligible public defense clients are individuals who possess a constitutional or statutory right to assigned counsel pursuant to Article 18-B of the County Law, Section 262 of the Family Court Act, Section 407 of the Surrogate's Court Procedure Act, 22 NYCRR § 205.19, Section 259-i(3)(f)(v) of the Executive Law or any other current or subsequently enacted statutory provisions conferring the right to assigned counsel.

II. GOAL OF THE PLAN

The goal of this Plan is for the Conflict Defender's Office and Assigned Counsel Program to provide high quality legal representation to eligible public defense clients.

III. OBJECTIVES OF THE PLAN

The objectives of this Plan are to:

- provide high quality legal representation to eligible public defense clients;
- ensure cost accountability of services; and
- provide increased efficiency for the courts by making qualified attorneys more readily available to handle cases.

IV. HISTORY

The Monroe County Assigned Counsel Program began operation in all courts in Monroe County in 1992. In 2003, pursuant to County Law 722(3)(a), the Monroe County Conflict Defender's Office was created by agreement between Monroe County, the Monroe County Bar Association and New York State. At that time, the Monroe County Assigned Counsel Program became part of the Conflict Defender's Office. The Conflict Defender's Office began operating in Rochester City Court, Monroe County Family Court and the appellate courts in Monroe County. The combined offices have continued to be one office, organized under a single administrator, the Monroe County Conflict Defender.

In 2019, the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services adopted Standards for Establishing and Administering Assigned Counsel

Programs. These "Black Letter Standards" recommend that assigned counsel programs "not be part of a ... Conflict Defender office." The settlement of the lawsuit in *Hurrell-Harring v. The State of New York* and the passage of New York State Executive Law § 832 has allowed for State funding to be used to adopt the ILS Black Letter Standards including effectuating the split of the Monroe County Conflict Defender's Office and the Monroe County Assigned Counsel Program into separate offices.

V. COUNTY RESPONSIBILITIES

A. It is the responsibility of Monroe County, along with New York
State, to deliver high quality legal services to eligible public defense clients
in all of the courts of Monroe County.

B. The County agrees that the Assigned Counsel Administrator and Conflict Defender will not be the same person and that the Offices will be separate and independent. The County agrees to comply with standards and performance criteria for Assigned Counsel and Conflict Defense Offices as established by the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services.

C. The County agrees to maintain a Conflict Defender's Office to represent eligible public defense clients in Monroe County Family Court, Rochester City Court, the appellate courts, and for the purpose of continuity of representation in County or Supreme Court when the matter has been

as part of an appellate process. The County agrees to appoint a full-time

Conflict Defender to administer the Conflict Defender's Office in

accordance with this Plan and applicable law.

D. The County shall authorize the Conflict Defender to hire attorney staff as well as clerical, investigative, and support staff to implement the terms of this Plan and effectuate the goal of providing high quality defense services to eligible defendants and other litigants. The County shall authorize the Conflict Defender to hire experts, including social workers and forensic experts, as needed to assist attorneys in representing clients.

E. The County agrees to maintain an Assigned Counsel Program

Office to administer the assignment of counsel to public defense clients

when the Public Defender's Office and Conflict Defender's Office are

unable to represent the client. The County agrees to appoint a full-time

Assigned Counsel Administrator (the "Administrator") to administer the

Assigned Counsel Program in accordance with the terms of this Plan and
applicable law. The County shall authorize the Assigned Counsel

Administrator to hire sufficient staff to implement the terms of this Plan and
ensure high quality representation of clients by Assigned Counsel Panel
attorneys.

F. The County will, in the annual budget process, allocate sufficient

resources to ensure high quality legal representation to the County's public defense clients.

VI. BAR ASSOCIATION RESPONSIBILITIES

A. Under this Plan, the Monroe County Bar Association will assume the following responsibilities:

- 1. Recruitment of Attorneys for the Assigned Counsel Program
- The Bar, in conjunction with the Administrator, will assist in the recruitment of private lawyers willing to accept Article 18-B assignments.
- 2. Recruitment of Attorneys for the Conflict Defender If requested, the Bar shall assist the Conflict Defender to develop a plan to recruit, train and retain attorneys.
- 3. Continuing Legal Education The Bar will recommend continuing legal education standards for panel attorneys. The Bar will also conduct at least one continuing legal education course a year in the areas of Family Court practice, local criminal court practice, felony court practice, and appellate practice unless the Appellate Division elects to conduct an appellate practice program.
- 4. Criteria for Attorney Selection The Assigned Counsel

Program Advisory Committee of the Bar, in conjunction with the Administrator, will recommend minimum criteria for panel membership.

- 5. Assigned Counsel Program Advisory Committee The Bar will maintain an Assigned Counsel Program Advisory
 Committee. A majority of the Assigned Counsel Program
 Advisory Committee members shall be attorneys who are not judges; and no members of the Assigned Counsel Program
 Advisory Committee shall hold a position as a prosecutor, law enforcement or government official. The Advisory
 Committee shall meet at least quarterly to ensure that the objectives of this Plan are met. The Advisory Committee shall respond to requests from the Administrator for information or for recommendations.
- 6. Upon request, a Conflict Defender Advisory Committee If requested by the Conflict Defender, the Bar shall establish a Conflict Defender Advisory Committee which shall be available to advise and assist the Conflict Defender, particularly regarding recruitment, training and retention of attorneys.

VII. CONFLICT DEFENDER

A. In accordance with the provisions of Article 18-B of the County

Law of the State of New York, there shall be an Office of Conflict

Defender, the head of which shall be the Conflict Defender.

B. The Conflict Defender shall be an attorney duly licensed to practice law in the State of New York and admitted to practice in all courts within the scope of the Plan. The Conflict Defender shall have a minimum of ten years' experience as an attorney in the practice of criminal law or family law. The Conflict Defender shall possess administrative experience and sufficient experience and skill in the representation of criminal defendants, parents in family law matters or appeals of criminal defense or Family Court matters. The Conflict Defender must have a demonstrated history of commitment to high quality representation of public defense clients.

C. The Conflict Defender shall be selected through a merit selection process. The Conflict Defender shall be appointed by the County Executive from a list of three names provided to the County Executive by the Monroe County Bar Association, subject to applicable civil service requirements and confirmation by the Monroe County Legislature. The Conflict Defender shall be subject to reconfirmation every two (2) years. The Legislature shall act upon the Conflict Defender's reconfirmation by the end of February of

each eligible year. The County Executive shall have the right to remove the Conflict Defender in accordance with applicable law.

- D. The Conflict Defender must have an ability to communicate effectively with clients, judges, lawyers who practice in all courts within the scope of this Plan, court administrators, other persons within the court system and county officials. The Conflict Defender must have an ability to effectively manage staff attorneys and other employees of the Conflict Defender's Office.
- E. The Conflict Defender shall be compensated at the same pay group as the Assigned Counsel Administrator.
- F. The Conflict Defender shall not be allowed to engage in the private practice of law.
- G. The Conflict Defender shall be prohibited from engaging in political activities. The Conflict Defender shall not directly or indirectly engage in any political activity except (i) as otherwise authorized by this section or by law, (ii) to vote and to identify himself or herself as a member of a political party, and (iii) on behalf of measures to improve law, the legal system or the administration of justice.

Prohibited political activity shall include:

(1) Being a member of a political organization other than enrollment and membership in a political party;

- (2) Being a member of any other group the principal purpose of which is to further the election or appointment of candidates to political office;
- (3) Participating in any political campaign for any office or permitting his or her name to be used in connection with any activity of a political organization;
- (4) Publicly endorsing or publicly opposing a candidate for public office;
- (5) Making speeches on behalf of a political organization or another candidate;
 - (6) Attending political gatherings;
- (7) Soliciting funds for or making a contribution to a political organization or candidate; or
- (8) Purchasing tickets for politically sponsored dinners or other functions.

VIII. CONFLICT DEFENDER'S RESPONSIBILITIES

A. The Conflict Defender shall have the powers and duties set forth in the laws of the State of New York, including the County Law, the Family Court Act, the Surrogates Court Procedure Act and other laws applicable to the provision of public defense services by a Conflict Defender. Such powers and duties shall include but shall not be limited to the following:

- 1. To represent financially eligible criminal defendants in misdemeanor and violation level offenses in Rochester City Court, without charge, as defined in § 722-a of the County Law and to represent people prior to the initiation of formal charges in Rochester City Court when it appears that such charges are imminent.
- 2. To represent, without charge, in a proceeding in Family Court or Surrogate's Court in the County of Monroe, any person entitled to counsel pursuant to § 262 and § 1120 of the Family Court Act, 22 NYCRR § 205.19, and § 407 of the Surrogate's Court Procedure Act, who is financially unable to obtain counsel, in accordance with this Plan. Pursuant to 22 NYCRR § 205.19, counsel shall be appointed to eligible individuals prior to the filing of a petition upon the request for counsel by a parent or legally responsible person, upon the prepetition request under Article 10 of the Family Court Act for an order for immediate removal of a child or temporary order of protection, or upon notice of an extra-judicial emergency removal of an child.
- 3. When necessary or appropriate, to obtain information regarding a potential client's eligibility for public defense

services.

- 4. To engage in planning and policy decisions with the County, the Bar Association, the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services, office staff and public defense clients.
- 5. To develop and execute County and other office policies;
- 6. To prepare, subject to necessary County approval, the program budget;
- 7. To recruit, train, supervise and evaluate attorney and non-attorney staff;
- 8. To ensure that attorneys, when appropriate and necessary, have access to and utilize non-attorney professionals, such as investigators, expert witnesses, social workers, paralegals, mitigation specialists, mental health professions and language interpreters;
- 9. To ensure that all attorneys have access to legal research services and an up-to-date motion and brief bank;
- 10. To implement guidelines created by the New York State
 Office of Indigent Legal Services relative to the maximum
 recommended number of cases assigned to each attorney;
- 11. To develop and implement a procedure to address client

and community complaints;

- 12. To act as a spokesperson for the Conflict Defender's Office in matters regarding policy and operation of the Office;
- 13. To engage in outreach and public education to the various communities in the County interested in and impacted by the criminal justice, family justice and appellate systems, and address matters that arise for the Conflict Defender's Office in relation to the criminal justice and family justice systems;
- 14. To maintain such statistics and make such reports as may be required by the County Executive, the County Legislature or the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services;
- 15. To perform such other duties as may be set forth in the Administrative Code and as may be required by other laws.

IX. CONFLICT DEFENDER'S OFFICE STAFF ATTORNEYS

A. The Conflict Defender shall recruit, train, evaluate and supervise staff attorneys in accordance with this Plan and as authorized by the County to represent eligible public defense clients in Monroe County Family Court, Rochester City Court, the appellate courts, and for the purpose of continuity of representation in County or Supreme Court when the matter has been transferred from Family Court or when an ancillary proceeding is initiated

as part of an appellate process.

- B. Pursuant to Article II, §C2-6, paragraph C, subparagraph (6) of the Monroe County Charter the staff attorneys shall be compensated at the same pay group as assistant public defenders performing similar work in the Public Defender's Office.
- C. The Conflict Defender's Office staff attorneys shall not be allowed to engage in the private practice of law.

X. ASSIGNED COUNSEL ADMINISTRATOR

- A. The Assigned Counsel Administrator shall be an attorney duly licensed to practice law in the State of New York and admitted to practice in all courts within the scope of the Plan. The Administrator shall have a minimum of ten years' experience as an attorney in the practice of criminal law or family law. The Administrator shall possess administrative experience and sufficient experience and skill in the representation of criminal defendants, parents in family law matters or appeals of criminal defense or Family Court matters. The Administrator must have a demonstrated history of commitment to high quality representation of public defense clients.
- B. The Administrator shall be selected through a merit selection process. The Administrator shall be appointed by the County Executive

from a list of three names provided to the County Executive by the Monroe County Bar Association's Assigned Counsel Program Advisory Committee, subject to applicable civil service requirements and confirmation by the Monroe County Legislature. The Assigned Counsel Program Advisory Committee shall select the three candidates after a transparent and thoughtful recruitment process. The Committee's selection process shall include a review of each candidate's resume and an interview process with the candidates that the Committee believes are the most qualified. The Administrator shall be subject to reconfirmation every two (2) years. The Legislature shall act upon the Administrator's reconfirmation by the end of February of each eligible year. The County Executive shall have the right to remove the Administrator in accordance with applicable law.

- C. The Administrator must have an ability to communicate effectively with clients, judges, lawyers who practice in all courts within the scope of this Plan, court administrators, other persons within the court system and county officials.
- D. The Administrator shall administer the Assigned Counsel Program in accordance with the terms of this Plan and applicable law.
- E. The Administrator shall be compensated at the same pay grade as the Conflict Defender.
 - F. The Administrator shall not be allowed to engage in the private

practice of law.

G. The Administrator may handle any type of case that falls under the scope of this Plan so long as it is commensurate with their experience and consistent with fulfilling the duties of Administrator.

H. The Assigned Counsel Administrator shall be prohibited from engaging in political activities. The Assigned Counsel Administrator shall not directly or indirectly engage in any political activity except (i) as otherwise authorized by this section or by law, (ii) to vote and to identify himself or herself as a member of a political party, and (iii) on behalf of measures to improve law, the legal system or the administration of justice.

Prohibited political activity shall include:

- (1) Being a member of a political organization other than enrollment and membership in a political party;
- (2) Being a member of any other group the principal purpose of which is to further the election or appointment of candidates to political office;
- (3) Participating in any political campaign for any office or permitting his or her name to be used in connection with any activity of a political organization;
 - (4) Publicly endorsing or publicly opposing a candidate for

public office;

- (5) Making speeches on behalf of a political organization or another candidate;
 - (6) Attending political gatherings;
- (7) Soliciting funds for or making a contribution to a political organization or candidate; or
- (8) Purchasing tickets for politically sponsored dinners or other functions.

XI. ASSIGNED COUNSEL ADMINISTRATOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. The Administrator shall effectuate the goal of providing high quality legal services to public defense clients and ensure the cost accountability of services.
 - B. The Administrator shall have the following powers and duties:
 - 1. Development and implementation of policies and procedures, in conjunction with the County, the Bar Association's Assigned Counsel Program Advisory Committee, the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services and other entities, regarding the Assigned Counsel Program, assigned lawyers and public defense clients.

- 2. Subject to appropriate County approval, development and execution of operational policies including voucher payment regulations, assignment procedures, and administrative policies that are necessary to effectuate the goals and objectives of the Plan or applicable laws, rules and regulations.
- 3. Subject to necessary County approval, preparation of the program budget.
- In conjunction with the Bar Association's Assigned
 Counsel Program Advisory Committee, recruitment of panel
 attorneys willing to accept assignments.
- 5. In conjunction with the Bar Association's Assigned Counsel Program Advisory Committee, establishment of minimum criteria for panel membership.
- 6. In conjunction with the Bar Association's Assigned Counsel Program Advisory Committee, design and development of an attorney program application that all attorneys are required to complete as a condition of accepting an assignment.
- 7. Review of each attorney's panel application and determination of the panel(s) from which an attorney may accept assignments utilizing the criteria established in

conjunction with the Bar.

- 8. Compilation and maintenance of a list of panel attorneys who are willing and qualified to accept assignments.
- 9. Design and implementation of a mandatory orientation program, including a mentorship program, for new panel attorneys. Such a program shall include a discussion of the expectations of high quality representation and administrative procedures.
- 10. Design and maintenance of a "second chair" program whereby a less experienced attorney is paired with a more experienced attorney to obtain necessary trial experience.
- 11. Requiring that all panel attorneys receive appropriate substantive, procedural and practical training to enable them to provide high quality representation.
- 12. Maintenance of a motion and brief bank that may be accessed by all panel attorneys, indexed and kept current.
- 13. Ensuring that all panel attorneys, when appropriate and necessary have access to and utilize non-attorney professionals such as investigators, expert witnesses, paralegals, social workers, mitigation specialists, mental health professionals and language interpreters. For State funding allocated for these

non-attorney professionals, the Administrator shall implement a protocol to review and approve panel attorney applications for these services.

- 14. Ensuring that all panel attorneys have access to legal research services.
- 15. Ensuring that all panel attorneys have the opportunity to consult with other qualified attorneys and experts regarding the handling of a case.
- 16. Ensuring that the representation of all panel attorneys be evaluated based upon objective criteria established by the Administrator and that panel attorneys be given meaningful feedback regarding the quality of the representation that they provide.
- 17. Ensuring high quality representation by periodically requiring attorneys to re-certify their panel membership.
- 18. Maintenance of the following panels:
 - Homicide/Predatory Sexual Offense Panel (any matter involving a death or a potential "life" sentence);
 - ABC Felony Panel excluding homicides and Predatory Sexual Offense cases;
 - DE Felony Panel;

- Misdemeanor Panel;
- Raise the Age Panel (in conjunction with the Appellate Division, Fourth Department);
- Appeals Panel (in conjunction with the Appellate Division, Fourth Department);
- Family Court Panel, including sub-panels requiring different levels of experience and expertise;
- Parole/Probation Violation Panel;
- "Other" Panel (such as representation of witnesses);
- Surrogate's Court Panel; and
- 19. In conjunction with the Bar Association's Assigned
 Counsel Program Advisory Committee or other organizations
 such as the Appellate Division, creation of any other panels as
 future circumstances may dictate and creation of minimum
 criteria for membership on any newly created panel after
 consultation with the Bar Association's Assigned Counsel
 Advisory Committee.
- 20. Selection of attorneys for assignments in accordance with this Plan on a rotating basis.
- 21. When necessary or appropriate, obtaining information regarding a potential client's financial eligibility for public

defense.

- 22. Maintenance of a record of all attorneys assigned, whether assigned directly by a judge or assigned by Assigned Counsel Program staff.
- 23. Implementation of guidelines created by the New York
 State Office of Indigent Legal Services relative to the
 maximum recommended number of cases to be assigned to
 individual panel attorneys.
- 24. Development and implementation of a complaint procedure that ensures that all complaints regarding attorney performance on pending cases are addressed.
- 25. Maintenance of a record of all complaints regarding attorney performance, unless a complaint is deemed meritless.
- 26. Review of attorney vouchers prior to submission to the disposition judge including any appropriate recommendations to the judge.
- 27. Development and implementation of standards for attorney billings in accordance with applicable laws, County policy, and the terms of this Plan.
- 28. Maintenance of such statistics and make such reports as may be required by the County Executive, the County

Legislature or the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services.

- 29. Representing the Assigned Counsel Program in matters involving policy and the operation of the program.
- 30. Addressing matters that arise regarding the Assigned Counsel Program, its attorneys when acting in their capacity as Assigned Counsel panel attorneys, and other actors in the criminal justice and parental representation systems.
- 31. Outreach and public education to the various communities in the County interested in and impacted by the criminal justice, family justice and appellate systems.
- 32. Institution of a yearly review process of the Plan to determine if the Plan's goals and objectives are being met and whether any changes are needed and the recommendation of such changes. The Administrator shall seek the comments and recommendations of representatives of the Bar Association's Assigned Counsel Program Advisory Committee, the County, the Judiciary, panel attorneys, and any other individuals or entities the Administrator deems appropriate. Based upon such a review, issue a written Annual Report to the County Executive and President of the Monroe County Bar

Association.

33. Consultation with the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services, the Judiciary and community groups regarding provision of indigent legal services in the County and performance of any functions or duties that may be necessary to accomplish the objectives of the Plan and effectuate applicable laws, rules and regulations.

XII. ASSIGNED COUNSEL PANEL ATTORNEYS

- A. Service on an Assigned Counsel Panel is a privilege, not a right.

 Panel attorneys are not employed by the County, but rather are independent contractors.
- B. Membership on the assigned counsel panels requires zealous representation of clients in a professional, skilled, ethical, holistic client-centered manner and compliance with the rules and expectations set forth herein.
- C. Attorneys must be admitted to practice law before the courts of the State of New York and be in good standing with the New York State Office of Court Administration. Upon request, attorneys must be able to provide proof of current completion of continuing legal education as required to maintain a license to practice in the State of New York.

- D. All panel attorneys must meet the minimum qualifications for panel membership set by the Administrator in conjunction with the Bar Association. Panel members may only accept assigned cases on panels for which they have been approved.
- E. As a condition to being eligible to accept assignments, each attorney must execute an assigned counsel panel membership application which contains the following information:
 - Attorney name and firm name;
 - Attorney address, phone number and email address;
 - Date of admission to practice;
 - Social Security number or Tax ID number;
 - The number of years in practice;
 - The percentage of work devoted to criminal practice, Surrogate
 Court practice, Family Court practice and appeals;
 - If applying for a trial level panel, the number of prior relevant trials conducted by the applicant, and the approximate dates of such trials;
 - If applying for the appeals panel, the number of prior relevant appeals conducted by the applicant, and the approximate date of such appeals;
 - Other relevant experience in the courts before which

assignment is sought;

- Any specialized training regarding the panel(s) being applied to;
- A writing sample;
- Disclosure of whether the attorney has malpractice insurance;
- Disclosure of any prior ethics complaints where discipline was imposed;
- Disclosure of any prior criminal convictions;
- Disclosure of any other matters that could impact the
 Administrator's decision as to whether the attorney should be
 on any panels or which panels might be appropriate;
- In his or her application, the panel attorney shall agree to the following terms and conditions of panel participation:
 - o The attorney will comply with the terms of the Plan, all standards promulgated by the Administrator, and all applicable laws and regulations;
 - The attorney agrees to immediately notify the trial judge and the Administrator if at any time the attorney believes he or she has a conflict of interest that would affect their representation or is unable to adequately or effectively represent his or her assigned client;

- The attorney will submit their voucher for final payment to the Administrator prior to submission to the assigning judge and in conformance with all program rules;
- The attorney will agree to the re-opening of a court order authorizing payment for previously submitted vouchers where subsequent vouchers submitted by the attorney provide reasonable cause for the Administrator to believe a billing error occurred in a previously paid voucher. All vouchers are subject to audit both before and after payment;
- Subject to the appeal procedure set forth in herein, the attorney agrees to comply with the determination of the Administrator regarding the level of case for which the attorney will be contacted to handle. An attorney initially denied placement on any particular panel may subsequently reapply for that panel after obtaining additional, qualifying experience;
- Panel members are prohibited from accepting private retainers from any client assigned by the court or the Assigned Counsel program;
- Attorneys must maintain a working e-mail account as a

- means of receiving information from and providing information to the Administrator or a designee;
- Attorneys must immediately notify the Administrator of any changes to their work telephone number, postal address, or email address;
- Attorneys must cooperate with monitoring, performance evaluations and investigations of any complaints, including billing discrepancies, by the Administrator;
- Attorneys are encouraged to maintain professional liability insurance;
- Once assigned to a case, the attorney agrees to remain as
 counsel of record for the duration of the case unless and
 until specifically relieved by the court with a new
 attorney being assigned, or the client retains counsel, or
 the case is completed;
- Panel attorneys agree to consistently and promptly comply with requests for information from the Assigned Counsel program regarding information that is necessary for the functioning of the program, meeting County and State reporting requirements and ensuring quality representation. Panel attorneys will not be required to

provide confidential information that would breach the attorney-client privilege or which would jeopardize the attorney-client relationship.

XIII. ASSIGNMENT PROCEDURE

A. All assignments shall be made by the Administrator unless the assignment is made by the presiding judge based on special circumstances as described below. The assigning judge shall have final authority to determine whether the attorney is qualified to handle the matter. The Administrator shall make assignments on a rotating basis from a list of all eligible participating attorneys. In assigning counsel, the Administrator shall whenever possible provide for continuity of counsel based on prior representation or current assignment on a pending case or cases, as long as the attorney is a member of the panel that handles the case being assigned.

- B. The Administrator shall give due regard to the following additional factors:
 - Potential conflicts of interest;
 - Geographic proximity;
 - Attorney caseloads; and
 - Attorney skill and experience with the type of case involved.

C. When the presiding judge assigns an attorney under special circumstances, the judge must select the attorney from the panel that handles the type of case being assigned. If the presiding judge makes the assignment, the court shall promptly notify the Administrator of the assignment of counsel. Upon receipt of a notice from a judge of an in-court assignment, the Administrator shall record the assignment on the panel attorney's record and the assignment shall be treated by the Administrator for rotation purposes, as though the assignment was made by the Administrator.

XIV. COMPENSATION FOR PANEL ATTORNEYS

- A. The rate of compensation paid to panel attorneys is set by New York State statute, County Law § 722-b. Pursuant to County Law § 722-b and other applicable laws, rules and regulations, the amount of compensation paid to panel attorneys shall be determined by the disposition judge after an appropriate recommendation by the Administrator.
- B. In accordance with Article 18-B of the County Law, and other applicable laws, rules and regulations, panel attorneys shall be reimbursed for expenses reasonably incurred during assigned representation.
- C. The Administrator shall have the authority to develop additional payment requirements in accordance with the applicable law or the

requirements of the County's auditors or the State Comptroller.

XV. PAYMENT PROCEDURES

A. After an attorney has completed an assignment, the attorney shall within 30 calendar days complete and forward to the Administrator a voucher setting forth the amount of time spent on each service, the total amount of all time spent, any expenses incurred (providing receipts when required) and any other information required by the Administrator.

Vouchers may be submitted for good cause after the 30-day time limit.

Vouchers may not be submitted more than 90 days after completion of the case unless in the judgement of the Administrator there are exceptional circumstances.

- B. The Administrator shall review the panel attorney's voucher for accuracy, ensure there are no irregular charges, ensure that all charges reasonably and accurately reflect services provided to clients were necessary to provide high quality legal representation and to ensure all time vouchered is in accordance with applicable billing guidelines, laws, rules and policies.
- C. After the Administrator's review, the voucher will be forwarded to the disposition judge with an appropriate recommendation to assist the disposition judge in their review of the voucher. The disposition judge is the judge who was presiding over the last substantive act in the case such as a

dismissal of the matter, sentencing, issuing a final Order, or referring a matter to the Grand Jury that was subsequently no billed. If the disposition judge is not available due to retirement, death or protracted illness, the voucher shall be forwarded to the appropriate supervising judge of the court or their designee.

D. If the Administrator has a question regarding a panel attorney's voucher, the Administrator shall contact the attorney and attempt to resolve the problem. If the attorney and the Administrator resolve the problem, the Administrator shall forward the voucher to the disposition judge along with the Administrator's recommendation regarding payment.

E. If the attorney and the Administrator cannot resolve the dispute, then the Administrator shall offer the attorney an opportunity to object in writing and forward the voucher and written objection to the disposition judge along with a written statement from the Administrator setting forth the Administrator's objections to payment of the voucher. A copy of the Administrator's written statement shall be sent to the attorney. The disposition judge shall make the final determination regarding the panel attorney's compensation, subject to any applicable appeal rights of the attorney or the Administrator.

F. The disposition judge may review the attorney's voucher for accuracy, to ensure that all claimed hours were necessary to provide quality

legal representation to the client and to consider the Administrator's recommendation. The disposition judge may consult with the Administrator or the attorney for additional information or clarification regarding the voucher.

XVI. ASSIGNED COUNSEL PANEL ATTORNEY COMPLAINT AND DISCIPLINE PROCEDURES

A. Upon receipt of a complaint regarding a panel attorney's behavior or performance, the Administrator shall investigate such complaint. Each investigation may, in the Administrator's discretion, include speaking to the person making the complaint, speaking to the attorney who is the subject of the complaint, speaking with the client and to any other person with relevant information and reviewing any relevant documentation.

- 1. If, at the conclusion of the Administrator's investigation, the complaint is deemed meritless, the Administrator will purge the complaint from the panel attorney's record.
- 2. All complaints deemed by the Administrator to be meritorious shall be maintained as part of the attorney's Assigned Counsel Program record. If the complaint is found meritorious and the attorney's conduct constitutes a violation of the New York Rules of Professional Conduct, the Administrator shall report such conduct to the Attorney Grievance Committee

of the Fourth Department.

- 3. If the Administrator determines that a complaint is meritorious but not of a serious nature, the Administrator shall resolve the matter after consultation with the attorney and the client, if the client made the complaint.
- 4. If the Administrator determines that there is merit to the complaint and the complaint is of a serious nature, the Administrator shall refer the matter for a hearing before the Complaint Resolution Committee. The Administrator may suspend the attorney from panel membership pending a determination of the Complaint Resolution Committee.
- B. The Complaint Resolution Committee shall consist of three members: one member to be designated by the Monroe County Bar Association, one member to be designated by the Administrative Judge of the Seventh Judicial District, and one member to be designated by the County.
 - C. A complaint of a serious nature includes, but is not limited to:
 - 1. Disbarment, suspension from practice, failure to maintain attorney registration in good standing, or any public censure by any attorney licensing body;
 - 2. A criminal arrest; Panel attorneys are required to notify the

Administrator within one business day if they are arrested for a criminal offense;

- 3. Failure to provide competent legal representation in an ethical and professional manner;
- 4. Substantial or continuous violations of Assigned Counsel Program rules or other applicable laws, rules and guidelines issued by the Administrator;
- 5. The intentional submission of materially incorrect information to the Administrator on panel applications, vouchers, or other submissions;
- 6. Billing improprieties; or
- 7. Accepting payment or requesting payment from assigned clients or their family members.
- D. If a complaint is referred to the Complaint Resolution Committee, the following procedures shall apply:
 - 1. Charging Document: The Administrator shall send a letter to the attorney outlining the alleged violations of the program rules.
 - 2 Representation: The Attorney is entitled to be represented by counsel at his or her own expense. The Administrator is entitled to be represented by counsel.

3. Pre-Hearing Procedures: Counsel for the Attorney and

Administrator will exchange documentary evidence and witness lists that include a summary of each witness's proposed testimony at least three (3) weeks before the hearing. The documentary evidence and witness lists including the summary of the witness's testimony will be presented to the Complaint Resolution Committee at least two (2) weeks before the hearing. The Attorney will provide a written summary of the attorney's defense at least two (2) weeks prior to the hearing. Upon a review of the witness lists and summary of the witness's testimony, the Complaint Resolution Committee may determine that it does not wish to hear live testimony from a witness, but instead rely upon the summary of their testimony provided by counsel. The Complaint Resolution Committee will notify counsel at least one (1) week before the hearing which witnesses, if any, the Committee wishes to have testify in-person or virtually.

4. Attorney as Witnesses: The Attorney has the right to testify on the attorney's own behalf. The Attorney may be cross-examined by opposing counsel. The Complaint Resolution

Committee will determine the appropriate scope of witness testimony, including the scope of cross-examination.

- 5. Other Witnesses/Confrontation of Opposing Witnesses: If the Complaint Resolution Committee determines it will hear inperson testimony from a witness, there will be a formal direct examination by the attorney calling the witness to testify.

 Direct examination will be followed by cross-examination by the opposing attorney. Whether re-direct examination and recross are permitted will be left to the discretion of the Complaint Resolution Committee. The Complaint Resolution Committee will determine the appropriate scope of witness testimony, including the scope of cross-examination. The Complaint Resolution Committee may ask questions of a witness.
- 6. Rules of Evidence: New York rules of evidence may be applied, but the Complaint Resolution Committee may waive the rules to provide a full and fair hearing of the matter.
- 7. Negative Inference: The Complaint Resolution Committee may draw a negative inference from an attorney's failure to cooperate with the Administrator's investigation into a complaint or the attorney's failure to participate in the hearing

before the Committee.

- 8. Burden of Proof: To impose discipline upon the attorney, the Complaint Resolution Committee must unanimously determine that the complaint has been established by just cause. If the burden is not met, the Complaint Resolution Committee will direct the Administrator to purge the complaint from the program's records. If the Complaint Resolution Committee determines that the Administrator has met the burden of proof, discipline may be imposed.
- 9. Discipline: The Complaint Resolution Committee may impose discipline up to and including permanent removal from the assigned counsel panels, suspension from the panels for up to one year, or any other lesser sanction that the Complaint Resolution Committee deems appropriate under the circumstances. During and after the period of suspension, the Complaint Resolution Committee may impose reasonable conditions on the attorney that provide the opportunity for counseling or remediation. During the course of remediation, the Complaint Resolution Committee may limit which panel the attorney may participate in or require that a mentoring attorney review the attorney's work product and performance.

If, after a hearing, a sanction of suspension or removal from the panels has been made, the Administrator must immediately notify all of the judges that the attorney is no longer eligible to accept assignments. The Administrator will promptly assign new counsel for the clients previously assigned to that attorney. When practicable the complainant, the clients of the attorney, and other relevant parties shall be notified of the final decision.

10. Conduct of Hearing: The hearing may be held virtually or in- person at the discretion of the Complaint Resolution Committee.

- 11. Memorializing: A court reporter will be utilized to memorialize the hearing.
- 12. Final Decision: Any decision of the Complaint Resolution Committee shall be considered a final decision.
- 13. A determination made by the Assigned Counsel

 Administrator or the Complaint Resolution Committee is not a
 bar to the filing of a complaint with the appropriate Attorney

 Grievance Committee.

XVII. PROCEDURES REGARDING DENIAL OF PANEL MEMBERSHIP

- A. If the Administrator refuses to grant an attorney membership on a panel, the attorney may seek an administrative review by the Complaint Resolution Committee.
- B. This administrative review will be a de novo review based upon a review of the attorney's application and any other documentary evidence submitted by the attorney or the Administrator. The Complaint Resolution Committee, in its discretion, may grant the attorney and Administrator oral argument on the matter. No testimony will be taken in this administrative review; nor will cross-examination be permitted.
- C. The decision of the Complaint Resolution Committee shall be final.
- D. If the Complaint Resolution Committee upholds the determination of the Administrator and denies the attorney membership on a panel, the attorney may re-apply for the panel with a subsequent application made more than one year after the denial. The attorney should provide new evidence of additional experience which would make them eligible for the panel. Such evidence could include one or more of the following: completion of Continuing Legal Education programs specifically applicable to the panel being applied to, second chair participation or mentorship

participation.

XVIII. SUPERSEDING PROVISION

This Plan supersedes the former plan, The Monroe County Bar
Association Sponsored Plan for Conflict Assignments, agreed to by Monroe
County and the Monroe County Bar Association on or about April 14, 2003
and subsequently approved by New York State.

XIX. SEVERABILITY

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this ordinance, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.

XX. EFFECTIVE DATE

The terms of this Plan shall go into effect immediately upon approval

by the Monroe County Bar Association, Monroe County, and the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services.

Upon the confirmation of a Conflict Defender by the Monroe County
Legislature in 2023, the Monroe County Conflict Defender's Office and
Monroe County Assigned Counsel Program will be considered separate
entities under separate leadership.

XXI. DURATION OF THE PLAN

The terms of this Plan shall remain in full force and affect unless terminated by either Monroe County or the Monroe County Bar Association. Monroe County or the Monroe County Bar Association may terminate the Plan at any time upon one hundred eighty (180) days written notice to the other. Upon receipt or initiation of a termination notice, the Assigned Counsel Administrator shall notify all judges of the termination.

In the event of Plan termination, the assignment of cases will revert to whatever method of assignment is required by applicable law at the time of termination.

This Plan may not be amended unless mutually agreed to by the Monroe County Bar Association and Monroe County, with the approval of New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services.

Funds will be used to fund operational overtime during details for the Sheriff's Office and the Towns of Greece, Irondequoit, and Webster. This is the eighth year local agencies located on the border were included on the Monroe County Border Patrol Operations Order. The County will receive the award and be responsible for coordinating the reimbursement of funds for the three local agencies who participate in Operation Stonegarden. This is the sixteenth year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents a decrease of \$12,510 from last year.
