

RE: Memorializing Congress and President Trump to Pass The Landlord Accountability Act of 2025

Honorable Legislators,

Despite continued enforcement measures, housing challenges persist for residents who rely on Section 8 vouchers and other forms of rental assistance. While fair housing laws exist to prevent discrimination, some landlords continue to find ways around these protections, creating ongoing barriers to stable housing for low-income individuals and families.

In Monroe County, housing discrimination continues to be a significant challenge, with many voucher holders facing barriers in securing rental homes. Despite ongoing local efforts to promote fair housing, individuals who rely on rental assistance are often denied property viewings, quoted inflated rents, or informed that units are no longer available.

H.R. 206, the Landlord Accountability Act of 2025, sponsored by Representative Nydia M. Velázquez, amends the Fair Housing Act, prohibiting discrimination based on a tenant's source of income. Under this bill, landlords will no longer be allowed to reject applicants solely because they use Section 8 vouchers or other forms of public rental assistance. This is especially important for low-income families, seniors, and individuals with disabilities who rely on these programs to find safe and secure housing. By prohibiting this loophole which has allowed landlords to deny housing under the pretense of "business discretion," this bill represents a significant step toward fairer and more equitable housing access.

The bill also creates new penalties for landlords who deliberately allow their properties to become uninhabitable and keep their units empty. H.R. 206 would hold these landlords accountable by imposing fines or other penalties for these practices. Additionally, H.R. 206 increases tenant protections by establishing a streamlined complaint system under the Department of Housing and Urban Development. Tenants who experience source-of-income discrimination, harassment, or unsafe conditions would have clearer and more accessible ways to report these issues. The bill requires public reporting of complaints,

increased transparency and help to identify violators, thereby increasing accountability amongst landlords.

With H.R.206, the Landlord Accountability Act of 2025, lawmakers pass an effective and systematic solution to persistent housing discrimination. It makes protections stronger, adds enforcement tools, and gives both tenants and the government better ways to hold landlords accountable.

We urge Congress and the President to act swiftly to pass this bill, ensuring that all families, regardless of income, have a fair shot at stable housing.

Honorable Legislators:

Lead poisoning is one of the most preventable public health crises affecting our communities today. Despite decades of federal regulations banning lead-based paint in homes built after 1978, New York continues to lead the nation in the number of children with elevated blood lead levels each year. The long-term effects of lead exposure are irreversible, ranging from IQ loss and learning challenges at low levels, to death at the highest levels.

S.2353A/ A.4820B: The Lead Paint Right to Know Act, sponsored by Senator Brian Kavanagh and Assemblymember Linda Rosenthal, offers a clear, proactive solution to a long-standing problem. This bill would require sellers of residential properties built before 1978 to disclose the results of any lead paint tests to potential buyers. Further this bill, would empower the New York State Department of Health to build and maintain a comprehensive statewide database of lead-based paint hazards in homes, thus allowing them to facilitate targeted public health interventions and resource allocation.

This commonsense policy ensures homebuyers are not left in the dark about the presence of a known neurotoxin in their future living space. It gives families the power to understand the risks and plan for necessary remediation before they move in, not after irreversible harm has occurred.

Passing The Lead Paint Right to Know Act is not just a step forward in combating childhood lead poisoning, it's a shift from a reactive to a preventive public health strategy. Instead of waiting until a child is already poisoned, this bill empowers prospective homeowners to know the risks upfront and take action to avoid them.



RE: Memorializing Congress and President Trump to Pass The Access to Counsel Act of 2025

Honorable Legislators,

The United States has long prided itself on its commitment to fairness and justice. Yet, under the current federal administration, this ideal is being undermined as people in our own communities are denied access to counsel during interactions with immigration enforcement. The consequences can be devastating as individuals may unknowingly waive their rights or make decisions which could negatively impact their futures simply because they were not given the opportunity to consult with counsel.

The Access to Counsel Act of 2025, S. 391/H.R. 944, introduced by Senator Alex Padilla and Representative Pramila Jayapal, seeks to address the pressing issue by ensuring all individuals subjected to secondary or deferred inspection at U.S. Customs and Border Protection facilities are granted access to counsel and other vital assistance. Whether they are U.S. citizens, lawful permanent residents, or nonimmigrants, all individuals in this position will be given the meaningful opportunity to consult with legal counsel within one hour of the inspection process beginning, and whenever necessary during the remainder of the process.

One of the key provisions of this bill is the recognition of the critical role legal counsel plays in ensuring due process. For individuals subject to secondary or deferred inspection, the bill will not only guarantee consultation with legal counsel, but will also allow interested parties, such as family members or sponsors, to advocate on their behalf. This will empower individuals to present any information or evidence in support of their case, further strengthening the fairness of the inspection process.

For lawful permanent residents, who are most vulnerable to the consequences of an uninformed decision during this process, the bill mandates Form I-407, the Record of Abandonment of Lawful Permanent Resident Status, cannot be accepted unless the individual has been provided with the opportunity to seek counsel. This ensures lawful

residents are fully informed of the consequences of abandoning their status before making such a serious decision.

The Access to Counsel Act of 2025 is a crucial step toward ensuring the rights of those interacting with our immigration system are protected, particularly at the point of entry, when individuals are most at risk of being deprived of their rights due to lack of access to legal representation.

We urge Congress to swiftly pass this legislation and implore President Trump to sign it into law, to ensure fairness, transparency, and justice for all individuals seeking to enter or remain in the United States.

Memorializing the New York State Legislature to Pass and Governor Kathy Hochul to Sign Bill S2282A / A7009, "Enacts the 'Pretrial Risk Overview for Threat Evaluation, Custody, and Treatment (PROTECT) Act"

Honorable Legislators:

Public safety is one of the fundamental pillars of government—essential to ensuring our families, neighborhoods, and communities are safe and secure. In New York State, public concern over rising crime has reached a tipping point. According to a December 2024 Siena Research poll, one in three New Yorkers listed public safety as a top priority for the State Legislature and Governor to address.

Here in Monroe County, the need for reform is especially urgent. From 2020 to 2024, the average number of murders in Rochester increased by 90% compared to 2011-2019. Over the same period, prohibited weapon offenses increased by 258%, and motor vehicle thefts rose by 206%. These alarming trends show that the current system is failing to protect law-abiding citizens—and we can no longer ignore the consequences of policies that prevent judges from considering a defendant's threat to public safety.

Bill S2282A / A7009, the Pretrial Risk Overview for Threat Evaluation, Custody, and Treatment (PROTECT) Act, offers a clear and commonsense solution. As the only state in the country that does not allow judges to consider public safety when making pretrial custody decisions, New York must act. This legislation would direct the Division of Criminal Justice Services to develop a standardized risk assessment instrument for individuals charged with a felony or Class A misdemeanor. This tool would help courts evaluate whether a defendant poses a credible threat to themselves or others and would provide guidance on release conditions, if appropriate.

In addition, the bill amends the Criminal Procedure Law to ensure that if an individual commits a new felony or Class A misdemeanor while awaiting trial, they must be held in the custody of the sheriff until arraignment. Following arraignment, the court must review the risk assessment and all relevant information. If the court determines that no condition of release can reasonably mitigate the risk to public safety, the individual must remain in custody.

This legislation is not about punishment—it is about prevention. It ensures that dangerous repeat offenders cannot continue to exploit the system, and it gives judges the tools they need to make informed, balanced decisions that protect our communities.

Therefore, we respectfully urge you to join us in calling on the New York State Legislature to pass, and Governor Kathy Hochul to sign, S2282A / A7009, the PROTECT Act. We owe it to the people of Monroe County—and to New Yorkers across this state—to restore public safety, common-sense laws, and accountability to our criminal justice system.



Honorable Legislators:

Supporting our local farmers means adapting policy to meet the realities of today's agricultural economy. Bill S1630/A2295, sponsored by Assemblyman Stephen Hawley and Senator George Borrello, modernizes New York's Tax Law by expanding eligibility for the agricultural property school tax credit to include farmers who lease qualified farmland for at least five years. Currently, this credit is limited only to landowners, excluding a significant number of working farmers—particularly young and beginning farmers—who operate on leased land.

In agricultural communities across Monroe County, especially in rural towns like Ogden, Wheatland, Churchville, and more, many farms depend on long-term lease arrangements to remain operational. This bill would help those farmers—who are just as vital to our local food supply and economy—access the same tax relief as landowners. At a time when farming is becoming increasingly cost-prohibitive, extending this credit is a commonsense step that would help preserve family farms and strengthen our region's agricultural base.

If enacted, the bill is projected to provide over \$2 million in annual school tax relief statewide to lease holding farmers. That's real savings that can help farms stay afloat, invest in equipment, and sustain operations through unpredictable markets and rising costs. For Monroe County, where agriculture remains a key part of our identity and economy, this legislation supports not only farmers but the rural character of our towns and the long-term preservation of open, working land.

Additionally, by making it easier for new and next-generation farmers to enter the field without the burden of land ownership, the bill promotes farmland accessibility and helps prevent the loss of productive agricultural land to development. It aligns with our broader commitment to

farmland preservation and rural sustainability, ensuring that Monroe County's farming heritage can continue for generations to come.

S1630/A2295 is not just about tax fairness—it's about keeping farming viable, accessible, and rooted in our communities. Instead, they were blindsided when the Pension Benefit Guaranty Corporation (PBGC) terminated their plans and imposed steep reductions, leading to severe economic hardship for countless families.

H.R. 1895 is a commonsense, compassionate, and fiscally responsible solution. It directs the PBGC to recalculate and restore full benefits for eligible retirees and beneficiaries, and to issue lump-sum payments to compensate for years of underpayment, including interest. These are benefits those retirees earned and deserve.

Importantly, the bill achieves this without burdening taxpayers. It draws from unobligated funds already within the PBGC, ensuring that justice is delivered without creating new costs for the public. In doing so, this legislation reinforces faith in our pension system and reasserts the government's obligation to uphold its commitments to American workers.

For Monroe County families — especially those in our community who once worked at the Delphi plant in Henrietta — this legislation is personal. It's not just about restoring lost dollars. It's about restoring trust. Therefore, I respectfully urge you to join me in calling on the



Approval of this submission will leverage \$6.2 million for the adaptive reuse of the former Hotel Cadillac to create a 42-unit mixed-income, mixed-use, and supportive housing project. Guidance issued by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development indicated that funds must be allocated to HOME-ARPA eligible activities that must primarily benefit qualifying individuals and families who are homeless, at risk of homelessness, or in other vulnerable populations.

Cain Properties, LLC was selected through a joint County and City of Rochester Request for Proposals.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize grant contracts pursuant to the American Rescue Plan ("ARPA") with the agencies listed in Attachment A in a total amount not to exceed \$3,303,664 for terms to commence on June 11, 2025 and terminate on or before December 31, 2026.

In January, Monroe County issued Requests for Proposals seeking respondents who would use ARPA funding to administer an Acquire, Rehabilitate, and Resale Single-family Homes program, the development of multi-family Affordable Rental Housing, a Home Improvement Program, and a Homeownership Assistance Program. The Acquisition, Rehabilitation, Resale program will increase the supply of single-family homes available to first-time homebuyers who are facing challenges in acquiring the dream of homeownership due to the competitive housing market for lower-income homebuyers. The multi-family Affordable Rental Housing program will make available additional rental units for lower-income seniors and provide high-quality, safe, affordable rental housing opportunities. The Home Improvement Program will provide grants to income-eligible homeowners to repair and revitalize their homes due to the increased cost of construction where they would not otherwise be able to do so on their own. This program will allow homeowners to remain stably housed. The Homeownership Assistance Program will allow a homeowner to realize their dream of homeownership through down payment and closing cost assistance to make their home purchase more affordable.

The Respondents listed in Attachment A were selected as the most qualified to provide these services.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute grant contracts, and any amendments thereto, with the agencies listed in Attachment A in a total amount not to exceed \$3,303,664 for terms to commence on or after June 11, 2025 and terminate on or before December 31, 2026.
- 2. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of these funds, any returned contractor funds, or any deferred revenue, in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, and to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments.

3. Should funding of these programs be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program(s) and where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program(s). Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance of the New York State Civil Service Law, and when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

Monroe County will serve as Lead Agency for the following two (2) actions, titled: Homeownership Assistance Program (First Time Home Buyers Program), Acquire, Rehabilitate, and Resale Single-family Homes program (Rochester Housing Development Fund Corporation for the Acquisition Rehab and Resale Program), which have all been preliminarily classified as Unlisted Actions. The provisions of the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act shall be complied with prior to Your Honorable Body undertaking, funding, or approving these projects. The Multi-family Affordable Rental Housing program and the Home Improvement Programs are Type II Actions pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5 (c) (2) ("replacement, rehabilitation or reconstruction of a structure or facility, in kind, on the same site, including upgrading buildings to meet building, energy, or fire codes unless such action meets or exceeds any of the thresholds in section 617.4 of this Part") and are not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for these grant contracts is included in the Department of Planning and Development, general fund 9301, funds center 1404010000, Community Development. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Each of these contractors has been reviewed for not-for-profit corporate status and the records in the office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that none of these agencies owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

Rochester Housing Development Fund Corp (RHDFC) - \$1,000,000: Acquisition Rehabilitation Resale – RHDFC will utilize funding to support the Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resale of 20 properties throughout Monroe County, benefiting first-time homebuyers making under 80% Area Median Income (AMI.) They will administer these funds under the framework of their existing programs, Home Rochester (within the city) and Make Monroe Home (throughout suburban Monroe County.)

Rochester Roots - \$789,250: Acquisition Rehabilitation Resale – Rochester Roots will utilize funding to support the Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resale of 8 vacant properties within JOSANA Neighborhood of the City of Rochester benefiting first-time homebuyers making under 60% AMI. The program will build upon previous phases of an existing neighborhood development plan, but will be the first phase to focus on owner-occupied units rather than affordable rental units.

CDS Monarch, Northfield - \$600,000: Affordable Rental Housing Development — Multifamily CDS will utilize funding to acquire, rehabilitate and lease-up The Northfield in Fairport. The Northfield consists of 69 supportive housing units and is currently managed by Family Services of Rochester. Through this funding, Monarch CDS will preserve 69 supportive housing units, benefiting seniors making under 60% and 50% AMI.

Rural Housing Opportunities Corporation (RHOC) – Home Repair Program - \$250,000: RHOC will utilize funding to assist 8 income-qualified homeowners in making necessary home repairs throughout Monroe County. RHOC, a subsidiary of PathStone, will utilize the structure of their Home Improvement Program, which has operated in Monroe County for more than 30 years.

The Housing Council at PathStone – Homeownership Assistance Program - \$664,414 Housing Council will utilize funding to assist 13 income-qualified, first-time homebuyers with direct down payment assistance and housing counseling services throughout Monroe County. The Housing Council will utilize its existing Homebuyer program as the structure for this assistance.

The proposed project, Midvale Commons, involves the new construction of 28 senior apartments for individuals aged 62 and older, located at 2770 Baird Road in the Town of Perinton. The plan includes the creation of 28 one-bedroom, bungalow-style units arranged across eight single-story buildings. Four of the buildings will each contain four side-by-side units, while the remaining four buildings will each include three units. Each apartment will offer a private entrance and range in size from 730 to 750 square feet. All units are designated to serve income-qualified senior households earning up to 30%, 50%, and 60% of the Area Median Income (AMI). The development is designed to meet New York State Homes and Community Renewal's (NYS HCR) Green Building and Stretch Sustainability Goals, with certification under LEED for Homes Gold and LEED Zero standards. This project is funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program, which aims to promote the creation of affordable rental housing options across Monroe County.

The Midvale Commons Project funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program has been preliminarily classified as an Unlisted Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617(b). Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether the Balinsky Gardens Project funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships ("HOME") Program may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

The proposed project involves the construction of a 104-unit, five-building multi-family residential development by Providence Housing, located on a 9.2-acre parcel situated behind 2590 Culver Road. The site is positioned along Culver Road in an area characterized by a mix of residential and commercial uses. The development will include 32 townhouse-style units, each offering three bedrooms, and 72 apartment-style units within a low-rise elevator building. The apartment building will feature 32 one-bedroom units and 40 two-bedroom units. The first floor of the elevator building will house various resident-focused amenities, including bicycle storage, resident service offices, leasing offices, maintenance facilities, and shared community space. Additional common areas will feature a community room with kitchenette, on-site laundry, a library, restrooms, secure package drop-off, and mechanical rooms. This project is funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program, which aims to promote the creation of affordable rental housing options across Monroe County.

The Balinsky Gardens Project funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships (HOME) Program has been preliminarily classified as an Unlisted Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617(b). The State Environmental Quality Review Act regulations found at 6 NYCRR Part 617 requires that no agency shall carry out or approve an Action until it has complied with the requirements of SEQRA.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Determine that Balinsky Gardens Project funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships Program is an Unlisted Action.

- 2. Make a determination of significance regarding the Balinsky Gardens Project funded through the Monroe County Home Investment Partnerships Program pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.7.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to take such actions to comply with the requirements of SEQRA, including without limitation, the execution of documents and the filing, distribution and publication of the documents required under SEQRA, and any other actions to implement the intent of this resolution.

This determination will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.

This proposed project is the construction of a 104 unit 5 building multi-family residential development by Providence housing. The subject property is a 9.2 acre site along Culver Rd. The site is a former landfill, is vacant and enrolled in the Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP). Comprehensive investigative and remediation plans are in place to address contamination and site cleanup including a Remedial Action Work Plan (RAWP) pursuant to the BCP in New York State DEC regulations. As part of the BCP the applicant adheres to the RAWP protocols for the removal of contaminated soil in the design of a vapor medication system is part of the remediation process. Site remediation will be conducted under state regulations, ensuring that the contamination is addressed prior to site occupancy. The Monroe County Division of Community Development is providing CDBG funding to promote affordable rental housing options throughout Monroe County.

The 9.2 acre site is accessible through Culver Road and is in an area with a mix of residential and commercial uses. Rezoned from R1 to R5 residential it is currently vacant but was previously a landfill and agricultural market. The site contains undocumented film material including construction debris up to 20 feet deep, primarily in former ravine. It was accepted into the Brownfield Cleanup Program in November 2023 as site number C828226. Hobby Creek lies 500 feet north with groundwater generally flowing northeast. A 2024 study found no wetlands, streams, or habitats for endangered species on the site. Based on review of the site, the project does not impact wetlands, the 100 year floodplain or any structures more than 50 years old. The project will not impact existing natural resources, wetlands, historical or cultural resources and will not alter the existing community character. The proposed action is consistent with existing land use. Accordingly, the proposed action will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts.

This project develops affordable housing opportunities by providing a direct subsidy for income eligible first time home buyers purchasing their first home in suburban Monroe County. A sub recipient acquires a single family home, develops works specifications for rehab, selects a contractor to complete the work and bring home up to minimum standards for resale to individuals purchasing homes, which are still subject to existing municipal building and zoning codes.

This program has no direct effects on the environment, all property involved in this program are privately owned and still subject to the New York State Building Code and municipal zoning laws. This program will not result in construction that results in the expansion of the original footprint; encroachment on wetlands, Critical Environmental Areas, floodplains; encroachment on a building, archaeological site, or district which is listed on the National or State Register of Historic Places, or that has been determined by the Commissioner of the NYS Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation to be eligible for listing on the State Register of Historic Places.

This project develops affordable housing opportunities by providing a direct subsidy for income eligible first time home buyers purchasing their first home in Monroe County and the City of Rochester. A sub recipient acquires a single family home, develops works specifications for rehab, selects a contractor to complete the work and bring home up to minimum standards for resale to individuals purchasing homes, which are still subject to existing municipal building and zoning codes.

This program has no direct effects on the environment, all property involved in this program are privately owned and still subject to the New York State Building Code and municipal zoning laws. This program will not result in construction that results in the expansion of the original footprint; encroachment on wetlands, Critical Environmental Areas, floodplains; encroachment on a building, archaeological site, or district which is listed on the National or State Register of Historic Places, or that has been determined by the Commissioner of the NYS Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation to be eligible for listing on the State Register of Historic Places.

The Rochester Housing Development Fund Corporation Program funded through the United States American Rescue Plan has been preliminary classified as an Unlisted Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR Part 617. The State Environmental Review Quality Review Act regulations found at 6 NYCRR Part 617 requires that no agency shall carry out or approve an Action until it has complied with the requirements of SEQRA.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Determine that the Rochester Housing Development Fund Corporation Program is an Unlisted Action.
- 2. Make a determination of significance regarding the Rochester Housing Development Fund Corporation Program pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.7.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to take such actions to comply with the requirements of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, including without limitation, the execution of documents and the filing, distribution and publication of the documents required under the State Environmental Quality Review Act, and any other actions to implement the intent of this resolution

This determination will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body determine whether the Town of Brighton Crittenden Road Sidewalk Project funded through the Monroe County Community Development Block Grant ("CDBG") Program may have a significant adverse impact on the environment pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA").

The Town of Brighton is proposing to install 1700 linear feet of concrete sidewalk within the right of way of Crittenden Road on the south side of the road from the corner of West Henrietta Road & Crittenden Road eastward approximately 1700 linear feet to East Squire Drive. These sidewalks will connect to the existing network of sidewalks that service Rustic Village Apartment Complex and surrounding businesses. The proposed sidewalks will improve overall safety for those who walk along Crittenden Road.

This project will not impact existing wetlands, or historical, cultural, or natural resources, nor will it alter the existing community character. The proposed action is consistent with existing land use and will increase the safety of nearby residents.

The Town of Brighton Crittenden Road Sidewalk Project funded through the Monroe County CDBG Program has been preliminarily classified as an Unlisted Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617(b). The State Environmental Quality Review Act regulations found at 6 NYCRR Part 617 requires that no agency shall carry out or approve an Action until it has complied with the requirements of SEQRA.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Determine that the Town of Brighton Crittenden Road Sidewalk Project funded through the Monroe County CDBG Program is an Unlisted Action.
- 2. Make a determination of significance of the Town of Brighton Crittenden Road Sidewalk Project funded through the Monroe County CDBG Program pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.7.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to take such actions to comply with the requirements of SEQRA, including without limitation, the execution of documents and the filing, distribution and publication of the documents required under SEQRA, and any other actions to implement the intent of this resolution.

This designation will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures of the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

Subject: 2025-2029 Five Year Strategic Plan and 2025 Annual Action Plan for Housing and Community Development in Suburban Monroe County and Grant Submission to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body approve Monroe County's 2025-2029 Five Year Strategic Plan and 2025 Annual Action Plan for Housing and Community Development in Suburban Monroe County and Grant Submission to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development ("HUD") for the Community Development Block Grant ("CDBG"), Home Investment Partnerships Program ("HOME"), and Emergency Solutions Grants ("ESG") programs.

Approval of this submission by HUD will provide the County with funding in the amount of \$3,034,996 for the period of August 1, 2025 to July 31, 2026. This represents the combined total of funds for the CDBG Program in the amount of \$1,755,420; the HOME Program in the amount of \$1,118,591; and the ESG Program in the amount of \$160,985. This year's allocations represent a \$24,605 decrease in funding received from HUD last year. This is the 50th year the County will receive this funding.

The CDBG, HOME and ESG programs have been designed to carry out neighborhood projects, Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) improvements to public facilities, community services, economic development activities, housing activities, and homeless services. Pursuant to HUD regulations, these programs must principally benefit low to moderate-income persons, the elderly, and persons with special needs who live in the towns and villages that participate in the Monroe County Community Development Consortium.

Members of the Consortium and community services agencies apply to the County to receive grants for projects, which are listed in the 2025 Annual Action Plan.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to submit the 2025-2029 Five Year Strategic Plan and 2025 Annual Action Plan for Housing and Community Development in Suburban Monroe County and Grant Submission to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development for the Community Development Block Grant, Home Investment Partnerships Program, and Emergency Solutions Grants programs.
- 2. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept the grant funds in the amount of \$3,034,996 or such other amount as determined by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), subject to HUD approval of the submission.

- 3. Appropriate the sum of \$3,034,996 for grant funds, or such other amount as determined by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), and the sum of \$372,053, which is the estimated Program Income expected to be generated during the program year, into fund 9005; funds center 1501010000, Community Development Grants, contingent on HUD approval.
- 4. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute all contracts, including intermunicipal agreements, and any amendments thereto, that are necessary to carry out the administration of the Community Development Block Grant, Home Investment Partnerships Program and Emergency Solutions Grants programs.
- 5. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute all agreements, debt instruments, and other documents for each loan, grant, relending project or activity which may be approved under the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Section 108 Loan Guarantee Assistance program, pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, and to accept, receive and reappropriate funds which are borrowed from HUD or any other party, and relend the same to qualified borrowers.
- 6. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to approve the use of contingency funds or funds reprogrammed from current or prior years pursuant to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development regulations.
- 7. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept, receive and appropriate or reappropriate any funds which accrue to the Community Development Office in the form of program income for use in connection with programs offered or funded by the Community Development Office, which administers the grants. All such income shall be utilized in accordance with the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development regulations governing the use of program income.
- 8. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
- 9. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify such program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law, and when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

The legislative action requested in connection with the 2025-2029 Five Year Strategic Plan is not an "Action," as that term is defined in 6 NYCRR § 617.2(b), and is not subject to review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act. The 2025 Annual Action Plan includes Type II actions pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(1) ("maintenance or repair involving no substantial changes in an existing structure or facility"); (2) ("replacement, rehabilitation or reconstruction of a structure or facility, in kind, on the same site, including upgrading buildings to meet building, energy, or fire codes unless such action meets or exceeds any of the thresholds in section 617.4 of this Part"); (5) ("repaving of existing highways not involving the addition of new travel lanes"); (6) "(street openings and right-of-way openings for the purpose of repair or maintenance of existing utility facilities"); (13) ("extension of utility distribution facilities, including gas, electric, telephone, cable, water and sewer connections to render service in approved subdivisions or in connection with any action on this list"); (26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment); and (31) ("purchase or sale of furnishings, equipment or supplies, including surplus government property, other than the following: land, radioactive material, pesticides, herbicides, or other hazardous materials") that are not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Monroe County will serve as Lead Agency for the following five (5) actions, titled: Town of Brighton's Crittenden Road Sidewalk project, Balinsky Gardens, Midvale Commons, First Time Home Buyers Program, Rochester Housing Development Fund Corporation and the Acquisition Rehab and Resale Program, which have all been preliminarily classified as Unlisted Actions. The provisions of the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act shall be complied with prior to Your Honorable Body undertaking, funding, or approving these projects.

This grant is funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from Health Research, Inc. in the amount of \$491,274 for the Expanded Partner Services Initiative for the period of April 1, 2025 through March 31, 2026.

The purpose of this grant is to conduct activities necessary to follow up on reports of persons living with a diagnosis of HIV infection within Monroe County and thought to be out-of-care. This funding will support the investigation of out-of-care patients; link patients to medical care and other non-medical services, as identified; elicit, notify, and test partners of their potential exposure to HIV; engage patients and named partners in risk-reduction conversations; provide supplies to prevent the spread of the disease; collect and/or verify identifying and demographic information related to HIV; and complete partner services field investigations. Funds will be used to provide partial salaries and benefits of existing staff, supplies and other costs to run the program. This will be the thirteenth year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents the same amount as last year.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$491,274 grant from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, Health Research, Inc. for the Expanded Partner Services Initiative for the period of April 1, 2025 through March 31, 2026.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Health by appropriating the sum of \$491,274 into general fund 9300, funds center 5802030200, STD Investigation & Prevention.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.

4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 234 of 2023, as amended by Resolution 188 of 2024, to amend and increase the contract with Ontario Bus Inc. for bus transportation services for the Monroe County Early Intervention and Preschool Special Education Programs from an amount not to exceed \$15,800,000 to an amount not to exceed \$19,000,000 for the second year (July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025) and third year (July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2026) of the contract, and appropriate assigned fund balance.

This contract will provide New York State-mandated transportation services to children within Monroe County who are receiving services through our Early Intervention and Preschool Special Education Programs. Children within these programs receive a variety of services, including but not limited to speech therapy, occupational therapy, and physical therapy, which often require transportation to and from the child's home. Ontario Bus Inc. has a history of successfully providing such services to this specialized population.

The Early Intervention Program has increased group capacity by an additional eighteen children, requiring the addition of four bus routes. The Preschool Special Education Program has increased classroom capacity by an additional seventy-two children, requiring an additional nineteen bus routes. The rates charged by Ontario Bus Inc. have not increased.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Amend Resolution 234 of 2023, as amended by Resolution 188 of 2024 to amend and increase the contract with Ontario Bus Inc. for bus transportation services for the Monroe County Early Intervention and Preschool Special Education Programs from an amount not to exceed \$15,800,000 to an amount not to exceed \$19,000,000 for the second year (July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025) and third year (July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2026) of the contract.

2. Amend the 2025 operating budget by appropriating assigned fund balance in the amount of \$6,400,000 into the Department of Public Health, general fund 9001, funds center 5807540000, PSE Transportation.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for this contract amendment will require \$6,400,000 of net County support for which the appropriation of assigned fund balance is hereby requested.

Foodlink, Inc. will take over catering services for the Congregate Meal Program for area senior centers.

The County issued a Request for Proposals for this service, and Foodlink, Inc. was selected as the most qualified vendor to provide this service.

The awarded grant is a collaborative effort among the county departments of Transportation, Public Safety, and Planning and Development. The grant will be used to conduct supplemental planning and demonstration activities to identify and mitigate hazardous conditions at intersections and address safety concerns in high-risk corridors. The objective of this project is to optimize safety measures to protect pedestrians, cyclists, and other vulnerable road users. The supplemental planning activities will include active transportation road safety audits and school zone safety audits, and the demonstration activities will include an adaptive signal control system, near-misses camera technology to enhance pedestrian crossing safety, and safety education campaigns. This grant provides 80% reimbursement for eligible expenses in support of the project. This is the first year the County has received this grant.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize a contract with and accept a donation of services from and through Genesee Transportation Council ("GTC") to undertake a Safe Routes Child Walk and Bike Safety Education Program for Monroe County at an approximate value of \$100,000, with a \$15,000 match from the Monroe County Department of Public Safety in monetary and in-kind services.

Through this acceptance of service, GTC will procure and contract with a qualified consultant to prepare a Safe Routes Child Walk and Bike Safety Education Program for Monroe County. The goal of this project is to strengthen collaboration with local schools, families, and education providers to enhance roadway safety and reduce severe injuries and fatalities among children walking and biking in our community. This will be achieved through the creation of effective educational materials, curricula, and activities. The Monroe County Departments of Planning & Development and Public Safety will work in conjunction with GTC in the development of this program.

This project will be 85% funded by the GTC through the FY24-25 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP), a federally-funded transportation planning program undertaken by GTC. GTC, through the UPWP, will fund and administer the Monroe County Safe Routes Child Walk and Bike Safety Education Program at an approximate value of \$100,000. The Department of Public Safety will provide an in-kind match of \$5,000 from staff support and a monetary match of \$10,000 from the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Safety.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with Genesee Transportation Council ("GTC"), 1 South Washington Street, Suite 520, Rochester, New York 14614, to accept a donation of services from and through GTC to undertake the Safe Routes Child Walk and Bike Safety Education Program for Monroe County at an approximate value of \$100,000, with a \$15,000 match from Monroe County in monetary and in-kind services.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 329 of 2023 to accept additional grant funding from the Dormitory Authority of the State of New York ("DASNY") in the amount of \$100,000; amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding for the project entitled "Construction of a 9/11 First Responders Memorial at Highland Park" by \$100,000 for a total project authorization of \$350,000; and amend Bond Resolution 330 of 2023 to increase financing for the project by \$100,000, from \$250,000 to \$350,000.

These additional grant funds would bring the total grant allocation for this project to \$350,000.

The proposed 9/11 First Responders Memorial will be located in Beikirch Park, the park formerly known as "Highland Park South," that is currently home to the War on Terror and Vietnam Veterans Memorials, among others. The concept for the proposed memorial includes two (2) eleven-foot-tall granite towers and one (1) 9-foot-tall brick structure surrounded by walkways, lighting, plaques, flagpoles, benches and landscaping. The total project cost is estimated to be \$350,000. The County was originally awarded a grant of \$250,000 for this project from DASNY, which is now being modified to \$350,000. The DASNY grant is sponsored by State Assemblymember Harry B. Bronson.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend Resolution 329 of 2023 to accept an additional \$100,000 from, and to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto with, the Dormitory Authority of the State of New York for the project entitled "Construction of a 9/11 First Responders Memorial at Highland Park," bringing the total award to \$350,000.
- 2. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding for the project entitled "Construction of a 9/11 First Responders Memorial at Highland Park" by \$100,000, from \$250,000 to \$350,000, for a total project authorization of \$350,000.
- 3. Amend Bond Resolution 330 of 2023 to increase financing for the project entitled "Construction of a 9/11 First Responders Memorial at Highland Park," capital fund 2085, in the amount of \$100,000, from \$250,000 to \$350,000, for a total authorization of \$350,000.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the New York State Office of Mental Health in an amount not to exceed \$197,864 for the PFC Dwyer Veteran Peer-to-Peer Support Program for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025.

The purpose of this grant is to support the design, implementation, and evaluation of peer-to-peer programs for veterans who are experiencing post-traumatic stress symptoms. The goals of the program are to provide outreach and education regarding available peer-to-peer counseling. It should also encourage family, friends and community connectedness as well as provide access to suicide prevention/intervention measures. This is the eleventh year the County has received this grant. This year's funding represents an increase of \$5,464 from last year.

This grant funds our efforts in support of veterans including the contract for the Compeer, Inc. for the Compeer Corps Peer Mentoring program. Compeer, Inc. provides an array of services, including one-on-one peer mentoring, group sessions facilitated by peer mentors and licensed therapists as consultants; and enhancement of social networking capabilities, virtual meeting spaces and other technological tools designed to help veterans connect with one another remotely.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a grant in an amount not to exceed \$197,864, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto, with the New York State Office of Mental Health for the PFC Dwyer Veteran Peer-to-Peer Support Program for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Veterans Service Agency by appropriating the sum of \$5,464 into general fund 9001, funds center 7401020000, Dwyer Peer to Peer Support.

- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to re-appropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
- 4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to modify or terminate the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This is a Type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR Section 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management not including new programs and major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Ouality Review Act.

Partial funding for this grant is included in the 2025 operating budget of the Veterans Service Agency, general fund 9001, funds center 7401020000, Dwyer Peer to Peer Support. The appropriated amount will adjust the current funding to that established by the grant.

ENACTING LOCAL LAW ENTITLED "WAIVER OF RESIDENCY REQUIREMENT FOR ATTORNEYS EMPLOYED BY MONROE COUNTY"

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. A new chapter shall be added as Chapter 392 of the Monroe County Code entitled "Waiver of Residency Requirement for Attorneys Employed by Monroe County" and shall read as follows:

§1 Definitions. Defined terms used in this local law shall have the same meaning as ascribed to them below:

COUNTY shall mean Monroe County.

ATTORNEY shall mean an individual employed by Monroe County as an Assistant District Attorney, a Deputy County Attorney, an Assistant Public Defender, or an Assistant Conflict Defender, provided however that for purposes of this Chapter it shall not mean anyone in a position in Pay Group 22 or above.

- § 2 Residency Requirement. Public Officers Law § 3, as amended or changed, is hereby amended and superseded in its application to the County as follows: provisions of Public Officers Law § 3, as amended or changed, requiring a person to be a resident of the political subdivision or municipal corporation of the state for which he or she shall be chosen or in which his or her official functions are required to be exercised, shall not prevent a person from being employed as an Attorney by the County, provided that such person resides in the County or any adjoining county within New York State.
- **Section 2.** If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this law, or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such order or judgment shall be rendered.
- **Section 3.** This local law shall take effect in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Home Rule Law and the Monroe County Charter.

- Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program Benefits Facilitator supports eligible public assistance recipients with mental health challenges to secure SSI and/or Social Security Disability (SSD).

In addition to the services listed above, this service component also includes maintaining and monitoring the use of Children & Youth Wrap funds to meet the individualized needs of children and families receiving mental health services, as well as support of the Disaster Mental Health Response Team.

SUPERSEDING BOND RESOLUTION DATED MAY 13, 2025

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$13,000,000 BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, NEW YORK, TO FINANCE COSTS OF THE REPLACEMENT OF VOTING MACHINES IN AND FOR SAID COUNTY, AT AN ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF \$14,000,000 AND SUPERSEDING THE BOND RESOLUTION ADOPTED ON NOVEMBER 14, 2023 (RESOLUTION NO. 351 OF 2023, AS AMENDED)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the replacement of voting machines in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$13,000,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$2,000,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes (\$11,000,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is ten (10) years, pursuant to subdivision 31 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$14,000,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the appropriation of \$1,000,000 from Capital fund 1996 and by the issuance of \$13,000,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose. the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local

Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance — Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- 1) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 351 of 2023, being a bond resolution dated November 14, 2023, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following: to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$14,000,000, and to provide \$13,000,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$2,000,000 over the \$11,000,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 351 of 2023.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body enact a local law entitled "Waiver of Residency Requirement for Attorneys Employed by Monroe County." This Local Law would assist our District Attorney's Office, Law Department, Public Defender's Office, and Conflict Defender's Office in attracting and retaining qualified candidates for attorney positions.

Our Monroe County legal offices have all experienced losing attorney staff to other counties, or being unable to recruit qualified candidates due to our residency requirement. Our neighboring counties generally do not require attorney staff to live within the county in which they serve. This Local Law would allow Monroe County to attract a broader pool of applicants and remain competitive with neighboring counties by permitting attorneys employed by the County to reside in either Monroe County or an adjoining county, while still ensuring that senior leadership positions in each of the County legal offices are required to reside in Monroe County.

The specific legislative action required is:

- 1. Schedule and hold a public hearing on the proposed Local Law.
- 2. Enact a Local Law entitled "Waiver of Residency Requirement for Attorneys Employed by Monroe County."

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR §617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.







This contract is revenue generating and no net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

The Coptic Monastery of Saint Shenouda is a not-for-profit entity and the records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that it does not owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.





The electric and water easements located under portions of Parcels 6a and 7a inhibit development of the property. The Monroe County Department of Environmental Services determined the underground electric and water easements are not in use and have essentially been abandoned. Plans for future development of the Parcels 6a and 7a call for a relocation of the easements to an existing tunnel easement.





The MWRR Capital Projects State Assistance Program is available to counties to provide up to a 50 percent match of eligible costs for capital projects that enhance municipal recycling infrastructure. In 2018, the EPS Densifier was procured and installed at the ecopark. The EPS Densifier allows residents to bring clean, white packing foam to the ecopark to be recycled. In 2019, Monroe County applied for the MWRR Grant-In-Aid to reimburse the County for costs associated with the EPS Densifier. In February 2025, the NYSDEC notified the County that a grant award had been made.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$28,600 Municipal Waste Reduction and Recycling Grant-In-Aid from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation under the Municipal Waste Reduction and Recycling Capital Projects State Assistance Program for costs associated with the Expanded Polystyrene Densifier at the Waste Management/Monroe County ecopark located at 10 Avion Drive in the Town of Chili.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(31) ("Purchase of sale of furnishing; equipment or supplies; including surplus government property other than the following: land, radioactive material, pesticides, herbicides, or other hazardous materials.") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept a grant from the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District in the amount of \$137,200 for the period of April 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026 for the Water Quality Program and authorize an intermunicipal agreement with the Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District in an amount not to exceed \$87,600 for the period of April 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026 for the completion of water quality projects.

The purpose of this grant is to assist counties that are members of the Finger Lakes-Lake Ontario Watershed Protection Alliance ("FL-LOWPA") in funding programs to improve water quality. Oswego County Soil & Water Conservation District is the sponsor organization for FL-LOWPA, responsible for the administration of this grant. In Monroe County, program components will include planning, education, and implementation of individual projects to improve water quality. The grant will be used to undertake water quality programs including the United States Geological Survey Cooperative Agreement for stream monitoring, public education of invasive species, and stream bank erosion repair projects. The County has received this program specific grant for nearly three decades. This year's funding represents an increase of \$30,000 from last year.

The Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District will provide stormwater management consulting and project management services to identify and implement water quality improvement projects, such as stream bank erosion and shoreline stabilization, in Monroe County and serve as the program manager for the New York State Watercraft Steward Program to control invasive species in Monroe County.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept a \$137,200 grant from, and to execute a contract, and any amendments thereto, with the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District for the Water Quality Program for the period of April 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Environmental Services by appropriating the sum of \$137,200 into pure waters fund 9307, funds center 8572020100, Office of Environmental Quality.

- 3. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute an intermunicipal agreement, and any amendments thereto, with the Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District, 145 Paul Road, Building 5, Rochester, New York 14624, for the completion of water quality projects, in an amount not to exceed \$87,600 for the period of April 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026.
- 4. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within the grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.
- 5. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(27) ("conducting concurrent environmental, engineering, economic, feasibility and other studies and preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This grant is 100% funded by the Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

The Monroe County Soil and Water Conservation District is a not-for-profit agency, and the records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that it does not owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

Subject: Authorize Contracts for the Preschool Special Education Program

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize contracts with the approved schools, agencies and individuals listed in Attachment A, and additional approved subcontractors as needed, in a total amount not to exceed \$45,000,000 annually for the provision of services for the Preschool Special Education Program (Preschool Program) for the period of July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2028.

The Preschool Program is a federally mandated program through the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. Monroe County is required by New York State to administer the Preschool Program to children, age three to five, who are eligible for special education services. The County fulfills this responsibility by contracting with a variety of eligible, State-approved, Preschool Program providers for evaluations, consultations, education and related services. The Preschool Program providers, who deliver Special Education Classrooms, Evaluations and Special Education Itinerant Services, submit an application and go through an approval process with the New York State Education Department. Based on the most recent school year with completed data (2023-2024), the Preschool Program served 3521 Monroe County children.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute contracts, and any amendments thereto, with the approved schools, agencies and individuals specified in Attachment A, and additional approved subcontractors as needed, for the provision of services for the Preschool Special Education Program, in a total amount not to exceed \$45,000,000 annually, for the period of July 1, 2025 through June 30, 2028.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Funding for these contracts is included in the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Health, general fund 9001, funds centers 5807510000, PSE Tuition & SEIT, 5807520000, PSE Related Services and 5807530000, PSE Preschool Evaluations, and will be requested in future years' budgets. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

The records in the Office of the Monroe County Treasury have indicated that none of these agencies or individuals owe any delinquent Monroe County property taxes.

Amend Resolution 324 of 2024 to Accept Additional Funding from the New York State Department of Health for Support of the Monroe County Nurse-Family Partnership Program

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend Resolution 324 of 2024, to accept additional funding from New York State Department of Health in the amount of \$842,935 for support of the Monroe County Nurse-Family Partnership Program.

The purpose of this grant is to provide support of the County's existing Nurse-Family Partnership ("NFP") program. The NFP program is an evidence-based nurse home visiting program that has been rigorously evaluated and includes expertly trained nurses delivering the services per a standard curriculum. The grant will provide a portion of the funding for the NFP program annually providing home visits to up to 300 high-risk, first time mothers, their infants and families to improve their pregnancy outcomes and their health, well-being and self-sufficiency. Funds will be used for partial salary and benefits of existing positions, administrative costs, training, printing, purchase of supplies to run the program, and vendor contracts. This is the seventh year the County has received this grant.

Funds will also be used to contract with UR Medicine Home Care, Licensed Services, Inc. dba Visiting Nurse Signature Care to provide the nurses who make home visits to all NFP clients, and for administrative support in arranging for travel, accommodations and training for the program.

The specific legislative actions required are:

- 1. Amend Resolution 324 of 2024 to accept an additional \$842,935 from, and to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Department of Health, for support of the Monroe County Nurse-Family Partnership Program, bringing the total program award to \$5,700,775.
- 2. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Public Health by appropriating the sum of \$337,174 into general fund 9300, funds center 5803050000, Nurse-Family Partnership.
- 3. Authorize the County Executive to appropriate any subsequent years of the grant award in accordance with the grant terms, to reappropriate any unencumbered balances during the grant period according to the grantor requirements, to make any necessary funding modifications within grant guidelines to meet contractual commitments, and to enter into any amendments to extend the time period of the grant.

4. Should funding of this program be modified or terminated for any reason, the County Executive is hereby authorized to terminate or modify the program and, where applicable, to terminate or abolish some or all positions funded under such program. Any termination or abolishment of positions shall be in accordance with New York State Civil Service Law and, when applicable, the terms of any labor agreement affecting such positions.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Honorable Legislators:

I recommend that Your Honorable Body accept additional funding from the New York State Office of Mental Health ("NYSOMH") and the New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports in the total amount of \$303,361 for the Court Navigator Program, and amend Resolution 427 of 2024 to authorize contracts for the provision of Mental Health, Developmental Disability, and Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services in 2025 and increase the contracts from an amount not to exceed \$51,475,417 to an amount not to exceed \$51,778,778 for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025. An updated Attachment A is attached reflecting the additional Mental Health, Developmental Disability, and Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services to be provided through contracts with the County and the vendors selected for the provision of those services.

The additional funding will provide for the services of Court-Based Mental Health Navigators pursuant to a previously authorized contract with Coordinated Care Services, Inc. This funding is expected to cover salaries, fringe benefits, administrative expenses, and program oversight.

Additional services and vendors identified in the updated Attachment A include the Incentive Stipend Program, the Youth Peer Mentoring Program, the Skill Building Program, the Homeless Support Service Program, the Senior Screening Program, and the Re-entry Program. Request for Proposals were issued for these services, with Housing Options Made Easy, Inc. D/B/A Recovery Options Made Easy, Compeer Rochester, Inc., Lifespan of Greater Rochester, Inc., House of Mercy, Inc., East House Corporation, YWCA of Rochester and Monroe County, and Delphi Drug & Alcohol Council, Inc. selected as the most qualified vendors to provide these services. These selected vendors and the services to be provided are set forth in greater detail in the updated Attachment A.

Please refer to the attached Purchase of Services Information Forms for disclosure of information required pursuant to Resolution 223 of 2007, as amended by Resolution 11 of 2008.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to accept additional funding in the total amount of \$303,361 from, and to execute a contract and any amendments thereto with, the New York State Office of Mental Health and the New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports for the period of January 1, 2025, through December 31, 2025.

- Amend Resolution 427 of 2024, to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to execute 2. contracts, and any amendments thereto, with the agencies listed in the updated Attachment A and any other agencies as necessary, to provide mental health, developmental disability, and alcoholism and substance abuse services for Monroe County residents, and to increase the contracts from an aggregate amount not to exceed \$51,475,417 to an aggregate amount not to exceed \$51,778,778, for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025, such contracts including but not limited to contracts with Housing Options Made Easy, Inc. D/B/A Recovery Options Made Easy, 75 Jamestown St, Gowanda, New York 14070, Compeer Rochester, Inc., 259 Monroe Avenue, Suite 109, Rochester, New York 14607, Lifespan of Greater Rochester, Inc., 1900 South Clinton Avenue, Rochester, New York 14618, House of Mercy, Inc., 285 Ormond Street, Rochester, New York 14605, East House Corporation, 259 Monroe Avenue, Suite 200, Rochester, New York 14607, YWCA of Rochester and Monroe County, 175 North Clinton Avenue, Rochester, New York 14604, and Delphi Drug & Alcohol Council Inc., 72 Hinchey Road, Rochester, New York 14624, for the Incentive Stipend Program, the Youth Peer Mentoring Program, the Skill Building Program, the Homeless Support Service Program, the Senior Screening Program, and the Re-entry Program in an amount not to exceed \$1,013,262 for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025.
- 3. Amend the 2025 operating budget of the Department of Human Services, Office of Mental Health, by appropriating the sum of \$303,361 into general fund 9001, funds center 5702010000, Mental Health Services.

This action is a Type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

This grant is 100% funded by the New York State Office of Mental Health and the New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports. No net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

DESCRIPTION/ PRIMARY OBJECTIVE(S):

Staff are provided to perform the following services under the direction of the Mouroe County Office of Mental Health to ensure access to behavioral health services for individuals in the community with the greatest need.

- Single Point of Access (SPOA) programs to support centralized, timely access to care management and residential services for adults and youth with intensive mental health and/or substance use needs.
- Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT) and Transition Management Program, which includes the establishement of Court Navigator services based at the Monroe County Socio-Legal Center to support ongoing linkage to behavioral health services for high need individuals, some of which have court involvement or histories of incarceration.
- The Rapid Engagement Delivery (RED) program which promotes engagement and retention for individuals with behavioral health and social services who have had frequent unsuccessful DHS application attempts and/or use of Emergency Housing services.
- The Forensic Intervention Team (FIT) which collaborates with law enforcement agencies across the county to assist individuals with mental health needs who have frequent contact with law enforcement. This program expanded to 24/7 operation in 2021.
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program Benefits Facilitator supports eligible public assistance recipients with mental health challenges to secure SSI and/or Social Security Disability (SSD).

In addition to the services listed above, this service component also includes maintaining and monitoring the use of Children & Youth Wrap funds to meet the individualized needs of children and families receiving mental health services, as well as support of the Disaster Mental Health Response Team.

Honorable Legislators:

We recommend that Your Honorable Body authorize the conveyance of a temporary environmental conservation easement to the Town of Penfield on the property located at 1775 Kennedy Road, Penfield, New York, Tax ID: 111.01-1-27 ("Property") for forty (40) years from the effective date of the easement.

The County originally purchased the 76-acre Property in 2015 to provide a buffer to adjacent lands that were the site of the former Gloria Drive Landfill. Your Honorable Body authorized the purchase of the Property by Resolution 239 of 2015.

Monroe County (Grantor) intends to convey to the Town of Penfield (Grantee) the right to preserve and protect the Property for the duration of the easement. With this easement, the County and the Town seek to retain the Property in its natural condition and to prevent any use of the Property that could impact the conservation value of the Property. The term of this easement shall be forty (40) years from the effective date of the easement.

The specific legislative action required is to authorize the County Executive, or his designee, to convey a temporary environmental conservation easement to the Town of Penfield on the property located at 1775 Kennedy Road, Penfield, New York, Tax ID: 111.01-1-27 for forty (40) years from the effective date of the easement.

This action is a type II Action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(39) ("an agency's acquisition and dedication of 25 acres or less of land for parkland, or dedication of land for parkland that was previously acquired, or acquisition of a conservation easement;") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Currently, Monroe County is the only major county in New York State that has not deployed an ALPR Program. Buffalo, Syracuse, Albany and New York City have already deployed ALPR Programs and proven their effectiveness at solving crime and enhancing public safety. With the support of representatives of Governor Hochul's office, this technology was identified as one of the most important efforts to enhance local law enforcement agencies' ability to address threats to public safety. This project was specifically identified in the Monroe County Sheriff's Office Law Enforcement Technology Grant application and implementation of the ALPR Program is fully funded by New York State.

The specific legislative action required is to incorporate by reference and adopt the attached resolution required by New York State to allow Monroe County to install license plate reader equipment and technology for an Automatic License Plate Reader Program within Monroe County and in right-of-way owned by the State of New York as described in the attached listing of locations.

The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$1,100,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid specific object or purpose (\$2,000,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is ten (10) years, pursuant to subdivision 13 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$3,100,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$3,100,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose, the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 429 of 2022, being a bond resolution dated December 13, 2022, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following: to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$3,100,000, and to provide \$3,100,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$1,100,000 over the \$2,000,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 429 of 2022.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Monroe County's CityPlace building is located at 50 W. Main Street in the City of Rochester. The eight (8) story building was constructed in 1907, is approximately 273,000 square feet, and houses various Monroe County Departments. The CityPlace Electrical & Mechanical Improvement Project will focus on improvements to the fifth floor computer server room's cooling system and standby power capabilities for critical areas to County Information Services network and Public Safety communications infrastructure.

Your Honorable Body, through Bond Resolution 429 of 2022, authorized financing for improvements for the project in the amount of \$2,000,000. Bids have been received, and the contemporary bidding atmosphere and construction escalation results in the need to increase the total bonding authorization for the project in the amount of \$1,100,000, from \$2,000,000 to \$3,100,000. Capital fund 2011, originally authorized by Your Honorable Body through Resolution 246 of 2021 and subsequently increased with bond financing through Resolution 168 of 2022, has been used to fund various improvements in CityPlace that have been substantially completed, and has a balance of funding. The Department of Environmental Services requests a portion of the balance of capital fund 2011 be reallocated to capital fund 2030 for the CityPlace Electrical & Mechanical Improvements Project.

Amend the 2025 Capital Budget and Bond Resolution 351 of 2023 to Increase Funding for the Project Entitled "Replacement of Voting Machines" and Amend the 2025 Capital Budget and Bond Resolution 384 of 2024 to Decrease Funding for the Project Entitled "Voting Equipment"

Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Monroe County Elections Commissioners Jackie Ortiz and Peter D. Elder.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2025 Capital Budget and Bond Resolution 351 of 2023 to increase funding by \$2,000,000 for the project entitled "Replacement of Voting Machines" from \$0 to \$2,000,000, and amend the 2025 Capital Budget and Bond Resolution 384 of 2024 to decrease funding by \$2,000,000 for the project entitled "Voting Equipment," from \$2,000,000 to \$0.

The \$2 million reallocation for voting machine replacement is necessary to address critical logistical challenges and comply with updated voter capacity requirements. Initially allocated for electronic pollbooks, these funds are now needed to purchase additional ES&S voting machines, ensuring a seamless transition between early voting and Election Day without transferring machines between locations.

The original allocation was based on a registered voter count of 480,000, but following the Presidential Election, that number has exceeded 500,000, requiring an increase in machines at select polling sites. Furthermore, machine allocation must be calculated at the poll site level, meaning additional voting machines are required at certain locations to meet demand.

Additionally, per NYS BOE Resolution 23-27, a single ExpressVote XL machine cannot serve more than 450 voters, with additional machines at the same site limited to 550 voters each, further necessitating this reallocation.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding for the project entitled "Replacement of Voting Machines" by \$2,000,000, from \$0 to \$2,000,000, for a total project authorization of \$14,000,000.

- 2. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to decrease funding for the project entitled "Voting Equipment" by \$2,000,000, from \$2,000,000 to \$0, for a total project authorization of \$0.
- 3. Amend Bond Resolution 351 of 2023 to increase financing for the Replacement of Voting Machines from \$12,000,000 to \$14,000,000.
- 4. Amend Bond Resolution 384 of 2024 to decrease financing for Voting Equipment from \$2,000,000 to \$0.

This is a Type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

These amendments to the capital budget will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures in the current Monroe County budget.

Funding for the Replacement of Voting Machines project, consistent with authorized uses, will be included in capital fund 1996 once the additional financing authorization herein is approved and in any other capital fund(s) created for the same intended purposes. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

I recommend that this matter be referred to the appropriate committee(s) for favorable action by Your Honorable Body.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the replacement of voting machines in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$13,000,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$2,000,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes (\$11,000,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is ten (10) years, pursuant to subdivision 31 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost thereof is \$14,000,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the appropriation of \$1,000,000 from Capital fund 1996 and by the issuance of \$13,000,000 bonds of said County herein authorized, provided, however, that to the extent any state and/or federal aid and/or grant and/or gift is received for the aforesaid purpose. the County Executive, or his designee, is hereby authorized to accept and shall use such funds to redeem any outstanding indebtedness incurred for such purpose or apply it, dollar for dollar, to reduce the amount of bonds to be issued for such purpose.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell the bonds and bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, the chief fiscal officer of the County under the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may sell such bonds or notes at public or private sale, at a discount or premium, at fixed or variable rates of interest or at no interest whatsoever, or as capital appreciation bonds, and with such amortization of principal as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine is most favorable to the County, and in compliance with any rules of the State Comptroller applicable thereto. Such bonds or notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer, consistent with the provisions of the Local

Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may, in the event it is determined to issue variable rate bonds or notes, enter into such agreements as said officer finds reasonable to facilitate the issuance, sale, resale and repurchase of such bonds or notes, as authorized under Section 54.90 of the Local Finance Law. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer is also authorized to enter into such agreements and take such other action as may be necessary or appropriate and lawful to assure that, to the extent possible, (i) interest on the bonds and notes authorized hereby will not be includable in the gross income, for federal income tax purposes, of the recipients thereof, and (ii) to enable the purchaser thereof to comply with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The Director of Finance – Chief Financial Officer is hereby further delegated all powers of this County Legislature with respect to agreements for credit enhancement, derived from and pursuant to Section 168.00 of the Local Finance Law, for such bonds or notes, including, but not limited to the determination of the provider of such credit enhancement facility or facilities and the terms and contents of any agreement or agreements related thereto.

Section 5. All other matters, except as provided herein, relating to such bonds or notes, including prescribing whether manual or facsimile signatures shall appear on said bonds or notes, prescribing the method for the recording of ownership of said bonds or notes, appointing the fiscal agent or agents for said bonds or notes, providing for the printing and delivery of said bonds or notes (and if said bonds or notes are to be executed in the name of the County by only facsimile signatures, providing for the manual countersignature of a fiscal agent or of a designated official of the County), the date, form, denominations, maturities, interest rate or rates, terms of and manner of sale and interest payment dates, place or places of payment, and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer. The Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer may elect to become the fiscal agent for the bonds or notes, or may contract on behalf of the County for this service pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Such bonds or notes shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Director of Finance - Chief Financial Officer shall determine.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes, as authorized by this resolution, may be contested only if:

- 1) such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said County is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) the provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution shall supersede Resolution No. 351 of 2023, being a bond resolution dated November 14, 2023, except to the extent that any indebtedness shall have been contracted or encumbrances made thereunder. The purpose of this superseding bond resolution is to effect the following: to increase the maximum estimated cost of the purpose to \$14,000,000, and to provide \$13,000,000 bonds therefor, an increase of \$2,000,000 over the \$11,000,000 bonds authorized under Resolution No. 351 of 2023.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the objects or purposes described herein.

Section 9. Honorable Legislators:

This matter is being referred to Your Honorable Body at the request of Monroe County Elections Commissioners Jackie Ortiz and Peter D. Elder.

I recommend that Your Honorable Body amend the 2025 Capital Budget and Bond Resolution 351 of 2023 to increase funding by \$2,000,000 for the project entitled "Replacement of Voting Machines" from \$0 to \$2,000,000, and amend the 2025 Capital Budget and Bond Resolution 384 of 2024 to decrease funding by \$2,000,000 for the project entitled "Voting Equipment," from \$2,000,000 to \$0.

The \$2 million reallocation for voting machine replacement is necessary to address critical logistical challenges and comply with updated voter capacity requirements. Initially allocated for electronic pollbooks, these funds are now needed to purchase additional ES&S voting machines, ensuring a seamless transition between early voting and Election Day without transferring machines between locations.

The original allocation was based on a registered voter count of 480,000, but following the Presidential Election, that number has exceeded 500,000, requiring an increase in machines at select polling sites. Furthermore, machine allocation must be calculated at the poll site level, meaning additional voting machines are required at certain locations to meet demand.

Additionally, per NYS BOE Resolution 23-27, a single ExpressVote XL machine cannot serve more than 450 voters, with additional machines at the same site limited to 550 voters each, further necessitating this reallocation.

The specific legislative actions required are:

1. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to increase funding for the project entitled "Replacement of Voting Machines" by \$2,000,000, from \$0 to \$2,000,000, for a total project authorization of \$14,000,000.

- 2. Amend the 2025 Capital Budget to decrease funding for the project entitled "Voting Equipment" by \$2,000,000, from \$2,000,000 to \$0, for a total project authorization of \$0.
- 3. Amend Bond Resolution 351 of 2023 to increase financing for the Replacement of Voting Machines from \$12,000,000 to \$14,000,000.
- 4. Amend Bond Resolution 384 of 2024 to decrease financing for Voting Equipment from \$2,000,000 to \$0.

This is a Type II action pursuant to 6 NYCRR § 617.5(c)(26) ("routine or continuing agency administration and management, not including new programs or major reordering of priorities that may affect the environment") and is not subject to further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

These amendments to the capital budget will have no impact on the revenues or expenditures in the current Monroe County budget.

Funding for the Replacement of Voting Machines project, consistent with authorized uses, will be included in capital fund 1996 once the additional financing authorization herein is approved and in any other capital fund(s) created for the same intended purposes. No additional net County support is required in the current Monroe County budget.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE AFFIRMATIVE VOTE OF **NOT LESS THAN TWO-THIRDS OF THE TOTAL VOTING STRENGTH** OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF MONROE, as follows:

Section 1. For the object or purpose of financing the cost of the replacement of voting machines in and for the County of Monroe, New York (the "County"), there are hereby authorized to be issued \$13,000,000 bonds of the County, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. The duly adopted current Capital Budget of the County, to the extent inconsistent herewith, is hereby amended to provide for the appropriation of an additional \$2,000,000 to pay the cost of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes (\$11,000,000 having been heretofore appropriated from one or more Capital Budgets). The period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is ten (10) years, pursuant to subdivision 31 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.
